BILL PROVIDES FOR RULES OF THE ROAD

Senator Smith's Proposed Law If Enforced Would Prevent Accidents

Rules of the road and provision for preventing accidents are embodied in Senate Bill No. 8, introduced by Senator J. C. Smith, which is planned to regulate traffic in cities and on the country roads. The bill comes up because existing conditions are such that travel in cities and on the roads of the state is dangerous because of the disregard of rules of the road by motorists. The bill declares the act is necessary for the "immediate preservation of the public peace."

Because of the fact that in many cases where people have been struck by automobiles and injured and left to suffer without help by the parties in the automobile, the act makes it obligatory on the driver of the automobile striking such a person to stop and render such aid as is necessary, and in case of collision with another automobile to render like assistance to the occupants of the vehicle struck. The name of the colliding vehicles, their numbers, the time, and the place of the accident are to be taken, the items are not to be used as determining the liability for fault or negligence. Neither party in a collision is to move away from the place of the collision without complying with this rule.

Among the many provisions in the act, the following are brief:

Vehicles proceeding in opposite directions pass to the right.

Vehicles proceeding in the same direction overtake each other by passing to the left.

The signal to pass shall be one blast of the whistle, or bell.

It shall be the duty of every overtaken vehicle to turn to the right and give one-half of the road.

Vehicles approaching an intersection shall be under control so as to permit the vehicle on the right of the vehicle approaching to first cross the intersecting street.

At all intersections the vehicle approaching the intersection from the right of any other vehicle approaching the intersection shall have the right of way.

Every person in charge of a motor vehicle shall so keep it in control that when approaching a vehicle drawn by a horse or horses every reasonable precaution to avoid frightening the animals can be taken.

To protect passengers alighting from street cars if necessary the machine shall be brought to a full stop before passing.

Jokeying or running for position by vehicles at parades is forbidden.

No races for speed shall be held on the streets or roads except on permission of authorities and the course properly patrolled.

Excess of twenty-five miles per hour is defined as unreasonable speed.

Any intoxicated person shall be deemed conclusively incapable to operate and control a motor vehicle.

Rights of Illegitimates.

Bills giving an illegitimate child the same rights of inheritance to the father's property and providing for the prosecution of a father who refused to settle with the mother and make provision for the maintenance of the child were introduced into the senate yesterday. The bill providing for prosecution of the father for failure to support or settle was introduced by Senator Olsen and the bill by Senator Smith of Josephine is designed to force the marriage of the parents of illegitimate children.

Senator Olson's bill passed the house at the 1913 session but failed in the senate. It is modeled after the Wisconsin law, and among its provisions are the following:

On complaint of the wronged girl the alleged father may be brought before a justice of the peace in the presence of the girl. If he is willing to make a satisfactory settlement to care for her in his illness and also secure the county against charges for maintenance of the child, and give a bond to indemnify the county from charges, he can be released.

If no settlement is made he can be held and released only on bond; if adjudged guilty he shall be charged with the maintenance of the child, the expense of the mother's illness, and costs of the legal proceedings.

Senator Smith's bill provides that if the court establishes three things—that both the father and mother are capable of marrying, that they are the parents of the illegitimate child, and that the defendant refuses to marry, then the court may enter a decree which will have the same effect as a marriage ceremony.

Cigarette Bill Has Teeth.

Data is now being gathered for what is believed to be one of the sharpest toothed anti-cigarette measures ever to come up before the Oregon legislature for passage. Already several representatives are asking to have the privilege of introducing the bill into the house. Mrs. Jennie Kemp, state president of the W. C. T. U., is one of the state wide figures behind the measure, which aims directly at the sale of cigarettes to minors.

Representative Eaton, of Lane county, has been selected among several to father the bill, which is declared to have sharp teeth that will take a good dentist to pull. It is hoped by this measure to be able to keep cigarettes

from growing boys. Scientific data is being secured to prove conclusively that the growing boy is injured by use of the narcotic.

Dr. Winfield Scott Hall, a professor in the College of Medicine of Northwestern University, was scheduled to speak in this city today on this question, and it is probable that his advice will be asked by those in charge of drafting the bill. Dr. Scott is a nationally-known lecturer on eugenics and he is well-acquainted with the anti-cigarette movement.

Just when the anti-cigarette bill will be introduced has not yet been settled, but it is believed it will not appear before the "bone dry" measure is fully disposed of.

H. B. No. 16, relating to advertisement of school district bonds; judiciary.

H. B. No. 17, requiring Lane county court to purchase land for a fair; exhibits and taxation.

H. B. No. 18, relating to power of district meetings to levy a tax on real and personal property; assessments and taxation.

H. B. No. 19, repealing law providing for county school supervisors; revision of laws.

H. B. No. 20, providing for school census to be taken the first week in November; educational.

H. B. No. 21, empowering state government to issue bonds for roads; roads and highways.

H. B. No. 22, relating to live stock running at large; livestock.

H. B. No. 23, to prohibit fishing for salmon and other fish by purse seines; fisheries.

H. B. No. 24, fixing salaries of justices of the supreme court; judiciary.

H. B. No. 25, relative to what wages are exempt; revision of laws.

H. B. No. 26, to fix salary of county school superintendent of Clackamas county; educational.

Willard promised him, he said, that he could have a fight if he would go out and whip Moran. Arrangements are about completed for a forty round bout between Fulton and Moran in Cuba, but the Minnesota scrapper wants a fight or so in New York before he goes to Havana for a mill.

Federation of Labor, which will meet in Union hall Monday, January 22. On January 23-24 and 25 the Oregon Retail Grocers association will come to Salem for its annual meeting. This association was organized last year at Pendleton, when the invitation through the Commercial club to hold its next meeting here was accepted. It is estimated that about 300 grocers will come to the capital city.

One of the largest organizations in the state, one with 2750 members, is scheduled to meet here Friday, January 20. This is the Oregon Threshers' association, of which Phil Bates is secretary.
