Gopher scalp money has been going rather slowly the past few days. The county clerk has purchased but a little over \$3,000 worth since the opening of the year. This leaves in the neighborhood of \$1,125, as there was an appropriation of \$4,125 this year.

A permit was issued this afternoon by the city recorder for the erection of a one story brick building, situated on lots 1 and 2 of block 10, in the North Salem addition. Today onions are selling wholesale at four cents a pound and the prediction is made that the price may go much higher. Frank Pohl, Schneider of the Lake Labish country yesterday refused four cents a pound for a carload shipment for the Yellow Danver onion and right on top of this onion story comes the information that really fine potatoes will bring one dollar a bushel. The merry farmer boy is surely in luck this year.

The purchase included the hospital fully equipped. It has 19 rooms and has contracts for the county work, that of the Southern Pacific at that point and of all the large sawmills in that section.
