Indicted Seattle Officials Enter Pleas of Not Guilty

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 29.—Mayor H. C. Gill this morning pleaded not guilty to a federal indictment, charging him with being a party to the Billingsley whiskey ring conspiracy to violate federal statutes. Other accused police officials were to plead later in the forenoon.

Gill's law partner, H. S. Frye, asked Federal Judge Jeremiah Neterer for a separate trial on behalf of his client. Chief of Police Beckingham was the only other official prepared to plead not guilty up to noon. He also announced he would seek a separate trial.

The mayor and the chief both announced today they would do all they could to hasten the trial by refusing to interpose technical delays. Hodge, twice said that he would attack the indictment and it may be that his contemplated action will delay the trial.

WILL OF ABE EATON GIVES BEQUEST FOR EDUCATIONAL WORK

La Grande, Ore., Jan. 29.—The will of Abe Eaton, admitted to probate in Multnomah county, disposes of an estate in Union county, Portland, and Boston Mass., estimated at over \$200,000.

Abe Eaton, pioneer of Union county, died in Portland last week and was buried in Union. The bequests are:

Mary L. Eaton, widow, \$100,000; to each of 22 nephews and nieces, \$2,500; Dan Baird, La Grande, \$1,000; David Baird, Baker, \$1,000; Belle Elaine Long, \$1; Maria Beard, deaconess home, Spokane, income from \$5,000; Methodist Episcopal church, Union, income from \$5,000; Willamette university of Salem Ore., the remainder of the estate, or approximately \$33,000.

Mrs. Mary L. Eaton, widow, is executrix and Amadee M. Smith, of Portland, administrator.

M. A. Zollinger, attorney of Portland, has been in Union this week in connection with the business of the estate.

The trustees of Willamette university are named as trustees of the bequests made to the Spokane home and the Union church. The will provides that any contestant of the will is to receive but \$1. The will is dated April 20, 1916.

Abe Eaton, known academically as Dr. A. E. Eaton, was not only a successful self-made pioneer of this section, but was a philanthropist even before his death.

Eaton hall, Willamette university, was made possible by a gift of \$50,000 and Mr. Eaton's minor gifts were numerous.

In recognition of his help Willamette university made Abe Eaton a "doctor."

Lumber Trade Booming According To Information by Coast Association

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 29.—The West Coast Lumbermen's association trade barometer last week registers the highest amount of unshipped orders for rail movement in the history of the industry.

One hundred and thirty-four mills show an accumulation of transcontinental business equivalent to 14,000 carloads, or approximately 352,475,000 feet. That is probably 8,000 cars in excess of a normal unshipped balance in that particular branch of the trade for this particular season of the year.

Production for the week amounted to 69,112,265 feet, representing a curtailment of more than 21 per cent, caused by car shortage, log scarcity and general labor inefficiency. These conditions are likely to prevail most of the present year, and taken in connection with constantly mounting production costs, probably will eliminate the factor of overproduction to a great extent.

The association's composite order file shows the acceptance of new business amounting to 73,644,124 feet, in spite of the tendency to refrain from loading up too heavily in the face of the current uncertainty as to delivery.

Of the total volume of new business taken on 2,064 carloads came from markets reached by rail. The orders in this particular branch of the trade were 19.38 per cent in excess of shipments, which amounted to 1664 carloads.

Heavy Cargo Trade.

In the cargo trade new business amounted to 16,228,812 feet, with 13,181,813 feet calling for coastwise delivery and 3,047,000 feet represent new business for export. Shipments in the cargo trade totaled 14,332,166 feet for the week, with 11,600,464 feet for the coastwise domestic markets and 2,731,702 feet cleared for foreign ports.

In all branches of the trade, the association's barometer shows 478,469,093 feet of lumber either awaiting transportation, or else in process of manufacture and covered by orders.

Export demand continues to improve, but the acceptance of export orders is restricted on account of continued shortage in ocean tonnage. Many new vessels are now going into commission, but as a rule such vessels have been under charter from the day the keels first were laid and their carrying capacity is therefore only figures in connection with clearing up old export orders rather than in the taking on of new business.

No Trace of Kidnapped Girl Found in Chicago

Chicago, Jan. 29.—Although police and private detectives have searched the "black belts" of Chicago, Gary, Evanston, Hammond and adjoining suburbs, no trace of Marjorie Delbridge, 12-year-old southern girl, who was kidnaped Friday night, has been found. She is believed to be in the hands of negro friends of Mrs. Camilla Jackson, her "mammy," and the authorities are redoubling their efforts to find her today.

Since Marjorie was found by welfare workers at the Livin Dixie cabin on the levee where the old ex-slave lived, and made a ward of the juvenile court by Judge Bowles, muttered threats have been made against "those white folks" by "Mammy's" dusky following. The golden haired, vivacious child virtually "lost" Little Africa, and was the idol of the negroes. She was known as "Mammy Jackson's child." Even among her dark hued playmates the color line asserted itself and Marjorie was always better dressed, more considerably treated and respected. At the "white chilluns" school where "Mammy" sent her, she maintained her standing, even studying music under a private teacher.

Backing the authorities in the search for the girl the fight to take her from her alleged negro abductors is the Daughters of the Confederacy, the Southern Women's club and juvenile officials. They claim that Marjorie is the daughter of a New Orleans actress, who, while on the stage was obliged to leave her infant in the care of the old mammy. Following her death, the negro came to Chicago with the baby and has cared for her since.

European War News Caused Advance in Wheat

Chicago, Jan. 29.—Sharp gains were recorded at the beginning of the market this morning on account of the German ruler's reported decision to fight to the bitter end. The attitude of the central allies in bringing peace by the naked sword dispels all thought of cessation of hostilities. Later in the morning the market declined slightly. May wheat opened up 2 and later gained 3-8, going to \$1.77 7-8. July opened up 2 3-4, later losing 7-8, going to \$1.49 3-8. September opened up 2 1/2, later declining half, to \$1.38 1/2.

Corn made good gains on first trades after higher opening. Later it followed the trend in wheat for a slight loss. May opened up 1 1/4, later losing 3-8 to \$1.01 1-8. July opened 3-4 and later declined 3-8, going to 99 1/2.

Oats started sharply higher, due to the strength of other grains. May opened up 5-8, but later dropped 1/4, to 37 1/2. July opened up 5-8, later losing 3-8, going to 35 1/2.

Provisions ruled firm, not much change being noted. Pork, lard and ribs opened up with a slight gain, the latter two maintaining their lead. Pork dropped slightly.
