THE Subscription club dances which in the past have been premier over anything Salem society has ever enjoyed, bid fair again this season to be the most notable functions of the winter's gaieties.

In fact so enthusiastic have its members become that the dances are regarded as more and more important and it requires courage indeed not to attend these brilliant functions. In spite of the size of these affairs, the coterie that makes up the Subscription list can enter into its amusement with the whole-hearted zest that makes for thorough enjoyment, with the result that the dances give the suggestion of informality, despite the fact that they are undoubtedly the largest and most formal functions that society here sponsors.

The second of this season's parties which was given on Tuesday night at the Masonic Temple was no less wonderful than preceding affairs, although entirely different. The attractive ball rooms were thrown together for the event and the walls almost completely concealed behind handsome Oriental rugs and tapestries, brightened here and there by vivid colored lights painted a picture of far Eastern splendor.

There were Oriental divans ornamented with pillows of many colors in every nook and corner and huge baskets of floral leaves hanging everywhere. The glow from handsome pedestal lamps and myriads of candles suffused the rooms in a rainbow of vivid color, visualizing the poet's conception of such an enchanted place.

To add to the atmosphere of the affair the orchestra played several oriental selections before the dance.
