members of the crews of the interned German ships Serapis, Neptune, Ottawa and Atlas, were taken today to Angel Island immigration station on orders from Collector of the Port Davis. The orders were issued suddenly when officers of the coast guard ruler how: wirelased during the night that members of the Serapis' crew were trying to escape. Four actually did get away before Davis decided to execute immediately orders from Washington to remove the crews. No explanation for the orders from Washington to seize the interned sailors was contained in the telegrams. Only a fraction of the German crews who were in the crews of these

ships when they originally interned were still on board when the vessels were put under guard. Captain A. S. Kowtowski of the Serapis, which is lying in Oakland estuary, told the United States district attorney that his crew originally numbered 40 and that only about 10 to 15 are still around the bay district.

Conspiracy Measures. Washington, Feb. 5.—Speeding up preparedness measures the senate judic-

ary committee today reported favorably on the seventeen conspiracy bills, "to prevent and punish conspiracy to injure or destroy property situated within the United States and belonging to a foreign government with which the United States is at peace."

Suffragets Will Help. Washington, Feb. 5.—To outline a plan for definite war service by women, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National American Women's Suffrage association today called the executive council of the association, consisting of 100 members.

Americans In Germany. Washington, Feb. 5.—It is the understanding of the state department that there are from two thousand to six thousand Americans in Germany. Nothing official as to the exact number could be learned today.

German Americans Loyal. Washington, Feb. 5.—Senator Wadsworth today presented to the senate a telegram from Representatives of 400 German and Austro-Hungarian societies pledging the sworn loyalty to the United States of 100,000 members and urging that all steps be taken to preserve peace.

Situation Is Tense. New York, Feb. 5.—Tense news about the New York customs house was increased today with the discovery that destruction of part of the building was narrowly averted Saturday when two

employees found a lighted bomb in a room directly under Port Collector Malone's private office.

The building has been under the strictest guard since indications of a break with Germany became apparent. Secret service men declared they knew of no stranger who had entered the building.

No Inaugural Parade. Washington, Feb. 5.—All preparations for participation of military organizations in the inaugural parade, were suspended today by Brigadier General Deyori, until he learns what decision as to the inaugural will be reached.

Germans Display Flags. Portland, Or., Feb. 5.—American flags decorated German meeting places in Portland today. The German House flew the Stars and Stripes. A message was telegraphed to President Wilson by the Federated German Speaking Societies of Oregon, urging peace "for

humanity's sake." The kaiser's birthday celebration, planned for Sunday was abandoned.

Spain Will Follow U. S. London, Feb. 5.—Spain will follow the United States against Germany, even as far as declaring war, according to a wireless dispatch received from Rome today quoting the Spanish ambassador there.
