MRS. THOMPSON ASKED
OPINION BY THE WORLDNew York Paper Wants Woman Legislators' Ideas
About the Situation

Because of her unusual position as the only woman in the Twenty-ninth legislative assembly of the state of Oregon, and the first woman to preside over the house of representatives from the speaker's chair, Mrs. Alexander Thompson yesterday received a telegram from the New York World asking for her opinion on the great crisis that now confronts the nation. The telegram reads as follows: "Mrs. Alexander Thompson, State Capitol, Salem, Ore. Will you kindly wire collect 100 words your view of the international crisis and the duty of American men and women. The World."

In reply to this request Mrs. Thompson sent the following: "The American nation is a peaceful nation. Never has it taken up arms except in defense of right. Never has it drawn a sword except at the behest of reason. Never has American blood been shed except in a just cause. The fact that we are not recognized as a great military nation assures the world at large that we love peace. Since the beginning of the frightful war in Europe the United States, through its matchless leader, Woodrow Wilson, has stood for peace with honor and while assuming an attitude of sympathy for stricken Europe has steadfastly preserved a neutral position.

"Prudence would dictate that this position be maintained. But the exigencies of the present grave crisis which confronts the nation seem to call for a reversal of our attitude. Clouds and darkness are around us; our nation's honor is at stake, and this is no time for petty fault finding and criticism. The president, I believe, has taken the only honorable stand possible under the circumstances. His position in the matter calls for patriotic and loyal support of every man and woman in America today."

HAS PUBLIC HEARINGCommittee of Lower House
Allowed Oratory Full Sway
Last Evening

One day of rest in seven was the theme that occupied the attention of the house committee on health and public morals last night in the house of representatives on the subject of Representative Gore's bill to make Sunday a day of rest. Several representative business men of Portland were present to speak against the measure being reported back to the house favorably and others pressed the matter for a favorable report.

Rev. J. L. Tufts, superintendent of the weekly day of rest league, spoke in favor of the bill and said that its provisions did not apply to the sale of drugs, medicines, gasoline, or other necessary articles, nor did it apply to the members of any religious sects who observed another day than Sunday.

He declared that he was not a businessman who is shut up in his store six days of the week and mostly seven. He asserted that man needed one day of rest in seven as it would promote the public health and give men a chance to enjoy their families. He said it aided public morals and that one day of rest was needed to preserve the welfare of the country and insure its prosperity.

Rev. H. G. Thurston, of the Seventh Day Adventist church, denied the right under the constitution to legislate in this manner. He quoted an authority that stated that "governments have no right to punish a citizen whether he professes a religion or none." How can a religious standard be set up and then punish those who disobey. The burden will fall on the non-Christian. He said the power to legislate was over things temporal and not over things spiritual. He said the proposed legislation was wrong and against the highest instincts of man. He declared all Sunday legislation a result of pagan Rome.

Carl Gregg Doney, of Willamette university, took up the cudgels in favor of the Sunday closing law and declared the opponents of the measure were trying to raise a religious issue that was not in it. The measure was intended to aid the poor man, the worker, who is compelled by force of economic necessity to work seven days in the week. He quoted the historian Meadeley who said that it was because of the observance of Sabbath for over 300 years that our civilization was firmly founded.

He declared that one day of rest is written in the bible of human nature and that the product of the man who works seven days is less in quantity and poorer in quality. Dan Kellaher of Portland, charged that the people did not wish Sunday closing, that in Portland they voted it down by large majorities. He cited election figures in Portland and showed that 10,987 voted for Sunday closing and 23,502 against. In California he said they voted Sunday closing down by a vote of 290,674 for and 457,890 against. He declared that people all over Oregon from the ranges of the eastern part to the cities of the western did not want such legislation.

Other speakers against the measure were J. E. Dunn of Portland; W. T. Hume, ex-district attorney for Multnomah county; C. E. Monroe, president of the Independent retail grocers league of Portland, and Mr. Hayward, a Seventh Day Adventist.

Mrs. Ada Wallace Unruh, noted prohibition worker, spoke in behalf of the bill, and Rev. Tufts closed the argument. Regarding a statement of Rev. Tufts concerning certain amendments up before the people in Portland, Dan Kellaher point blankly charged that it was an untruth, and Rev. Tufts declared his statement was made on the authority of one who was supposed to know.

The committee took the matter under advisement.

Spain Will Be First Nation
to Follow America's Lead

London, Feb. 6.—Spain will apparently be the first of the neutral nations to join America in severing relations with Germany.

Madrid's answer to Berlin will be forwarded today. Premier Romanones and his cabinet worked until a late hour last night drafting a note. The exact contents are not known—but authoritative dispatches from Madrid today declared it would be either a firm protest against Germany's unlimited submarine warfare, or else a definite notice that Spain is about to take America's course in the matter.

Except for a few known pro-German newspapers and those representing the clerical party, the whole Spanish press is a unit in approval of a firm course by Spain, at whatever cost. Enthusiastic approval is voiced of the course taken by the United States.

"Humanity should be grateful to the United States," declared El Pais in an editorial typical of the general attitude of the press.

American Ambassador Willard at Madrid has been in the closest touch with Premier Romanones during the last few days. Madrid dispatches today did not indicate whether Spain has yet prepared formally to answer President Wilson's invitation to all neutrals to join with America. Presumably such action awaits Germany's receipt of the note which Spain will send today.

Rest Day Rallies Held

Two bills now before the legislature one day of rest in seven (S. B. 149) and the Sunday rest (H. B. 292) bills were discussed Sunday by Dr. G. L. Tufts of Portland and the Leslie M. E. church in the morning and at the South Salem Friends church at night.

In discussing these measures, Dr. Tufts said in part:

"The laws of health demand that all workers shall have one day of rest in seven. Medical science teaches that he who labors every day will shorten his life by ten years on the average. Yet there are some 30,000 seven day per week toilers in Oregon. They are on the street cars of Portland and Salem, on our railways and other public utilities, in our work shops and factories, in our stores, homes and hotels, and in many trades and avocations of the people. Our text declares that 'Six days may work be done, but the seventh is the Sabbath of rest, holy unto the Lord.'"

"As far as practicable the weekly rest day should fall on the day set apart by the people as their day of worship, whether it be Saturday or Sunday. There is no need of mercenary business being conducted more than six days of the week. The proposed law gives the Jew and the Adventist their choice of Saturday or Sunday closing. All others will be closed on Sunday, the common American rest day. This will promote the public health, the do-
