Fraser's report was received by telegraph from Queenstown. He declared the German submarine opened fire on the Evestone from a distance of 3000 yards and that her projectiles struck the vessel repeatedly. When boats were lowered, Fraser declared, the German's guns were turned on these, containing survivors of the sinking Evestone.

"These shrapnel shells struck the Evestone's open boats, killing the master, steward and three sailors, including Richard Wallace, the American," the report continued. "The second officer was wounded."

"When the boats containing the survivors had rowed 500 yards away, the Evestone sank. The submarine then approached near the boats—but made no inquiry as to injuries to the survivors, nor her commander proffered aid."

It was pointed out here that the consul's report specifically fails to mention any of the three factors which might be construed as making the sinking of the Evestone legal under international law. He did not say that the Evestone was warned in advance of the attack; he did not mention resistance offered by the Evestone, nor were there any details of an attempt to escape her assailant.

Unofficial Queenstown dispatches today quoted survivors landed there as telling harrowing stories of their experience in being shelled by shrapnel while endeavoring to escape. Two boats were launched by the crew when it became apparent the Evestone was in a sinking condition, but before these two had entirely cleared away the German gun fire began.

State Department Will Rule Secretly On Sailings

Washington, Feb. 7.—The state department is about to make a secret ruling on the sailings of American ships.

This fact became officially known today along with announcement that the American line steamer St. Louis will not be given a convoy.

The notification will be forwarded to American ship lines including the American line. The state department will not give out the statement, because they say, President Wilson does not wish to make it public.

Apparently no restrictions will be placed on publication from the steamship offices.

KING GEORGE OPENS PARLIAMENT SESSION WITH ADDRESS TODAY

Declares Germany's Recent Overtures Offered No Possible Basis for Peace

London, Feb. 7.—England and her allies are steered unanimously to secure "just reparation, reparation for the past and guarantee for the future," and no "threats of further outrages," by Germany can move them from this determination.

King George so voiced the entente's purposes in his "speech from the throne" in the house of lords, marking opening of parliament today. He insisted that Germany's recent proffers had contained "no possible basis for peace."

"During the winter," the king continued, "my navy maintained unrelenting and ceaseless watch on the seas and enforced vigorously a blockade of the enemy. My armies conducted successful operations in Europe, Mesopotamia and are fully prepared to renew the struggle in close and cordial cooperation with my allies in every field."

"I trust their united efforts will carry the successes already won to a victorious conclusion."

"I have invited representatives of the dominions and the Indian empire, which have borne so glorious a share in the struggle, to confer with my ministers on important questions of common interest relating to the war, which step, I trust, will result in re-establishment of closer relations in all parts of the empire."

"The accomplishment of the task to which I have set my hand will entail unceasing demands upon the energies and resources of all my subjects, but I am assured that the people will respond to every call necessary to the success of the cause with the same indomitable ardor and devotion that has filled me with pride and gratitude since the war began."

"I pray Almighty God to give His blessing to your councils."

Was put its sombre touch on the usual picturesqueness and colorful gorgeousness of a parliament opening. There was a modified parade, with a good deal of the pomp of other days, but precedent was smashed when, for the first time in the history of the ancient lawmaking body, the peers and peeresses who attended the ceremonies wore merely simple, plain, morning clothes in place of the gorgeous robes and coronets heretofore donned.

The king and queen journeyed to the parliament opening—which took place at noon sharp—in a plain coach drawn by six black horses. There were the usual cavalcades of royalty, including the Royal Horse Guards, but the war touch was furnished in squads of mounted officers representing the army of each of England's dominions and colonies, who formed part of the procession from the palace to the parliament buildings.

These officers were dressed in the service khaki uniforms of the trenches, instead of the usual gorgeous court uniforms glittering with gold lace.

The procession inside the parliament building was mostly naval and military. Four hundred wounded colonial soldiers and officers attended by uniformed nurses, occupied the whole of the royal gallery.

All foreign diplomats were present and here, too, precedent was broken, for, instead of appearing in full state regalia, with court uniforms, the diplomats wore frock and cutaway coats.

A few selected foreign newspaper writers, including the representative of the United Press, were especially invited to witness the ceremonies.

Four Persons Killed.
London, Feb. 7.—Two persons aboard the British steamer Saxon Briton were killed when that boat was sunk by a submarine today. The captain and 14 members of his crew were safely landed. Twelve were survivors of the British steamer Azul, also reported sunk.

Two More Are Sunk.
London, Feb. 7.—The British steamers Vestra and Crown Point were officially reported sunk today.

The Saxon Briton was an iron screw steamer of 1,337 tons; built in 1883, registered at Grangemouth, England, and the property of the Kerr Steamship company.

The Azul is a steel screw steamer of 3,074 tons; built in 1898, registered at London and the property of the Buenos Aires Great Southern Railway company.

The Vestra was a steel screw steamer of 1,021 tons, registered at Grangemouth and owned by J. T. Salveen & Co.

The Crown Point was a steel screw steamer of 5,215 tons, registered at Liverpool and owned by Norfolk & North American Steamship company.

With the two other steamers previously reported sunk, the tonnage of vessels sunk today so far totaled 10,050.

OFFICIAL RECORDS OF NINE RURAL ROUTES

Mail Handled Out of Salem Office Aggregates Great Total

The official records of the nine rural mail carriers out of Salem for the month of January is as follows:

Route No. 1 for which E. N. Branson is carrier, includes 27.3 miles. Mr. Branson, like all the mail carriers into the country, reports at 7 o'clock in the morning and leaves the office at 7:45 after ascertaining his mail. He delivers to 205 families with 596 patrons over 10 years of age. During the month he delivered 14,003 pieces of mail and collected 2,149, giving a total number of pieces handled, 16,152.

Route No. 2 is covered by Chas. W. Brasher. He travels but 22.5 miles and generally gets back to the office at 2:15 in the afternoon. He delivers or did deliver in January, 13,320 pieces of mail and collected 1,937, making a total of 15,257 pieces handled. On this route are 243 families with 700 patrons more than 16 years old. Anyone under 10 years of age is not considered a patron.

Route No. 3 is in the care of Lyman McDonald, who travels 25 miles daily. He has the large number of 347 families to please every day, with 1,157 patrons. Last month he delivered 23,020 pieces of mail, collected 2,490, making a total of 25,510 pieces handled.

Route No. 4 is served by George F. Litchfield, traveling 24.1-8 miles daily. He gets back from his work about 2:45 p. m., but every day he must take note of 297 families with its 899 patrons over 10 years of age. During January he delivered 17,684 pieces of mail and collected 2,077, making a total of 19,761.

Route No. 5 is in the care of James S. Albert, who travels daily 24.4 miles in serving 163 families. These families are of pretty fair size as the record shows 1,553 to be over the age of 10. He delivered in January 19,015 pieces of mail and collected 3,521, making a total of 22,536 pieces handled.

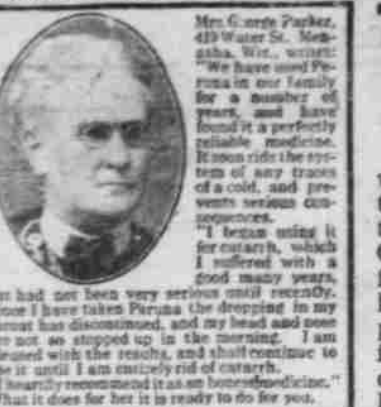
Route No. 6 is served by Oratien L. Fisher. He delivered 18,500 pieces and collected 2,847. On this route are 216 families with 1,353 patrons. Mr. Fisher goes to work at 7 o'clock in the morning and manages to get back to the post-office on average days at 2:45 o'clock.

Route No. 7 is traveled by Percy Pugh, who gets back from his day's work at 2:15 p. m. On this route are 260 families with 762 patrons over 10 years old. The mail delivered numbers 15,690 pieces and collected 2,517. Hence he handled during January, 18,207 pieces.

Route No. 8 of which Fremont L. Smith is carrier, calls for the delivery of mail to 266 families with 798 patrons. Mr. Smith begins work at 7 o'clock and

Route No. 9 is in the care of James A. Remington. He delivers to 188 families with 641 patrons and manages to get back to the post-office by 2:45 p. m. During January he delivered 13,100 pieces of mail and collected 1,721. Hence during January he was obliged to note carefully 14,821 pieces of mail.

SWISS REMAIN NEUTRAL
Berlin, via Sayville wireless, Feb. 7.—The Swiss federal council met yesterday in order to discuss President Wilson's invitation to neutrals to join his action. Its decision is not yet known.

The newspaper Berner Bund, which frequently is semi-official in utterances, writes: "In our opinion, which certainly also is that of the whole Swiss nation, the federal council will not swerve from strict neutrality."

The official press bureau wireless report also quotes at length several other Swiss newspapers which argue that Switzerland's traditional policy of neutrality will not permit her to join the United States.
