Cranberries are now quoted at \$8 a barrel, compared to \$10 for last week. This may not effect the retail price for some time but the information is given for the benefit of the good housekeeper who would like to learn of at least one article of food that has not advanced in price.

Tommy Atkins, the British soldier, will soon be eating Willamette valley prunes, that is, if a submarine doesn't get them. The Drager Fruit company will ship tomorrow from the Roseburg plant, 3,500 boxes of prunes, each box weighing 50 pounds, to New York, where they will be delivered to the Cantina committee of the British army. This is the first shipment sold this year direct to the English government.

At a special school meeting called for the purpose of organizing a new school district at Hall's Ferry district, No. 138, Marion county, the following were elected directors: Mrs. L. M. Lankford, chairman; W. H. Buffon and Wm. Meier. The clerk elected for the new district is Mrs. W. C. Pettijohn. About 50 persons were present, including County School Superintendent Smith.

The Forrester's of America are today moving into their new lodge rooms, 329 North Commercial street, and the meeting Thursday night will be held in the new quarters. The rooms were formerly occupied by the Salem Motocycle club which was fully equipped with club fixtures and a reading room. These were bought by the Forrester's and several improvements will be made. The main room is 22 by 66 feet, giving the lodge much larger quarters than those formerly occupied.

As the law now stands, if a dog refuses to be caught by the pound master and his assistants, the owner of the dog may be arrested and brought before the bar of justice. After he has completed his four months training, he will be given an additional furlough of 10 days and traveling time to come home before being assigned to his ship. Mr. Michaels says that he is much pleased with his work and has selected the engineering branch. His pay has been raised from \$17.60 to \$24.20 a month and all found. His ambition is to become a machinist with pay of \$30.50 a month.

The champion chess and checker player, Newell W. Banks, who played several exhibition games here last week at the Commercial club, will make a return visit next week. On account of the lateness of the hour, many did not see him play his blindfolded games. For this reason, the blindfolded games will be scheduled for the first event of the evening when the champion will play against 10 of the best players in town. Those interested in this exhibition make the announcement that the public in general is invited to witness the play and especially the ladies. The blindfolded games will begin at 8 o'clock. The evening of the exhibition has not as yet been decided on but it will probably be Tuesday or Wednesday.
