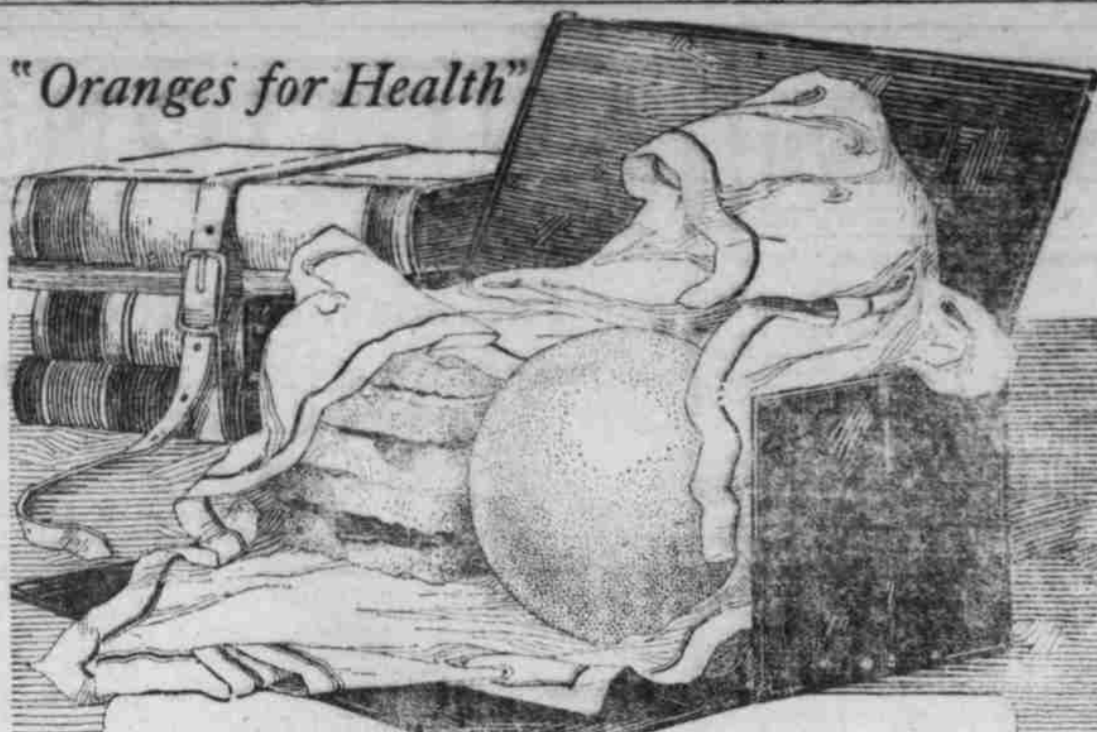

The commodities carried in January of this year included 2475 cars of lumber, compared with 1138 cars for the first month of last year; 883 cars of potatoes, which was 84 more than in January, 1916, and large loadings of grain, fruit, vegetables, canned goods, fuel wood, sand and gravel.

These figures refer to the Portland division only, and the percentage of increase over a year ago is greater on the Oregon lines than for the entire Southern Pacific system," said Mr. Dyer.
