Tacoma Bond Issue for Army Camp Legal

Tacoma, Wash., March 6.—The last obstacle to condemning land for the 70,000 acre army camp at American Lake was swept aside today when the supreme court at Olympia handed down a decision approving the \$2,000,000 bond issue.

J. T. S. Kyle, special counsel for the county, will begin immediate preparation of the condemnation suit by which the land is to be acquired.

The court's decision was unanimous. It was based on the theory set forth in the law passed by the present session of the legislature commanding the county to acquire the site.
