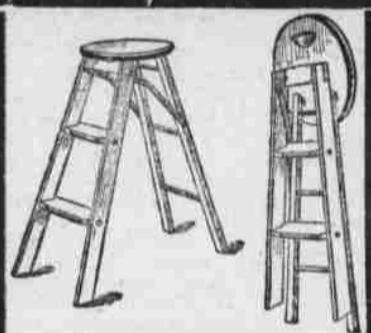

For several days great quantities of oranges have been coming in by fast freight until every fruit dealer and grocer in town has a large supply of this wonderful fruit. ### Price Decline Sharp In Chicago Markets

Chicago, Mar. 7.—Grains, which, without exception, opened higher today, declined sharply later. The improved ear situation and a feeling that prices had gone high enough were given as causes. A dump of from 25 to 50 cents in the hog market after the official close, sent provisions tumbling from 25 to 75 cents. May wheat opened up 3-4, later declining 1 7-8 to \$1.89 5-8; July opened up 7-8, subsequently losing 1 3-8 to \$1.55 5-8; September opened up 7-8 and later lost 5-8 to \$1.46 3-4.

Corn opened stronger but prices reacted with wheat. May opened 7-8, but later declined 1 1-4 to \$1.08; July opened up 1 1-8 and later lost 1 3-8 to \$1.07 1-4; September opened up 5-8, subsequently losing 1 to \$1.06 1-4.

Oats opened sharply higher, but the gain was eliminated when other grains dropped. May opened up half, later losing 1 1-8 to 50 3-8, while July, which opened up 1-4, declined 3-4 to 57 1-4 on the drop.

Provisions opened irregular. Pork was up but lard and ribs remained unchanged. Later, with the decline in the hog market, sharp losses were recorded. Pork fell from 72 to 87 cents. Lard and ribs showed similar losses.

### MINNESOTA MILITIA UNDER SUSPICION

#### Conviction of German Member of Treason Reflects On All

St. Paul, Minn., Mar. 7.—Large numbers of German-Americans who constitute one-fourth of the Minnesota National Guard, are under suspicion, following the conviction of Private Paul L. Scharfenberg, Company L, First Minnesota infantry, of treason, it became known today. Scharfenberg was sentenced to five years at the federal prison at Leavenworth, after it became established that he wrote his mother in Germany, ridiculing the United States army, attacking President Wilson and asserting 10,000,000 Germans in the United States would revolt in case of war with Germany and flock to the fatherland.

Attempting to provide Germany with United States military information was the specific charge against the Gopher guardsman. His letter to his mother was intercepted by British censors and returned to the United States government.

"President Wilson will soon be out of the way all right," the letter said. Just what means were to be employed to send the executive into oblivion were not stated. He referred to officers of the United States army as "cobblers, who would not stand up and fight in case of invasion."

His conviction became known when a contingent of guardsmen returned today from the border. He was recruited into a regiment returning today when the guard left. His life before enlisting is unknown. He was born in Germany.

### WANTS HIGH CLASS ART EXHIBITS HERE

#### Would Have Art Association and Bring Exhibits to Salem

There is a movement under discussion among art lovers in Salem for the establishment of an art association, under the auspices of which high class art exhibits could be brought to this city and placed on display for short periods.

It is believed that such an association is needed in the city and that its establishment would do a great deal toward developing an appreciation for the best there is in painting and sculpture.

Portland has such an art association and it has been a great benefit in bringing close home the works that have gained fame throughout the world for their beauty and artistic significance. Salem has a large number of people who are interested generally in pictures but the average taste has not been educated to an appreciation of the best.

Art For Everybody  
The idea that art is for the wealthy, for the artist alone, is decried because art itself lies close to the heart of each and every human in some way or other, and needs only the opportunity to spread its possessive wings.

It is suggested that a convenient and suitable place to house exhibits would be the auditorium of the city library, and that it could be made as useful from this standpoint as it is in presenting the great operas by means of the vietrloia.

Portland's art institute this month is drawing interested visitors on account of the exhibition there of the pictures of Jonas Lie (pronounced Lee), who spent some time in the Panama canal zone. A large number of the pictures of this exhibit are of Panama scenes and the construction of the great canal.

The exhibit will be seen at the institute, which is located at Fifth and Taylor streets, all through March, when it will be sent to San Francisco. It is declared by art critics that these pictures are wonderful in the stories they tell of the magnitude and poetry of the tropics and the canal.

It is pointed out that if Salem had an art association and a place in which to house an exhibit like the one now in Portland, it would add much to the city as an art community in bringing such exhibits here for a few days at least.

That a move will be made in the near future looking toward the establishment of such an association is believed certain. Mrs. Monroe Gilbert, of the Franz Shors, is enthusiastic over the idea and believes a great deal could be done in forming a right artistic taste in the young people of Salem.

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### GERMANY STIRRED UP CUBAN REVOLUTION

#### Promised Aid To Rebels In Effort To Worry the United States

Havana, Mar. 7.—Direct evidence of Germany's aid to the Cuban rebel cause was declared to have been uncovered today in examination of papers found after the arrest of Dr. Luis Otavio Divino, a well known liberal leader, and two members of the Cuban congress. According to police officials, a proclamation signed by revolutionary leaders, a copy of which was discovered in Divino's home, contain the statement that "Germany has promised to aid."

Since publication in the United States of the Zimmerman letter and circumstantial stories carried in American newspapers of the activities of various German propaganda organizations, Cuban government officials have been active in searching out possible German machinations here. It has been charged that a number of American agents were siding and that proof had been found of the existence of an organization called "the iron cross."

Defection by voluntary surrender of Pedro Del Portal, a well known leader in the revolutionary movement, gave the insurrectionary movement a body blow, in the opinion of government officials today. Portal was expected here today under guard.

"The general condition could not be more satisfactory," declared a formal statement issued by President Menocal, "in view of special circumstances attending the seditious movement."

The president declared the Santiago rebels "must either surrender or be driven into the sea."

### HIGHWAY COMMISSION HOLDS FIRST MEETING

#### State Divided Into Districts—Cantine and Four Others Cut Out

No highway engineer was chosen by the new state highway commission, which met yesterday for the first time. The commission decided to make complete investigation as to the qualifications of the candidates for the position of highway engineer, which position carries a salary of \$5,000 a year. Applications from Oregon men and engineers from other states have been made to the commission for the job.

When the commission met yesterday, it was called to order by W. L. Thompson, of Pendleton. On motion of J. E. Adams, of Eugene, S. Benson, of Portland, was chosen chairman and the commission got down to business. The session lasted until late yesterday afternoon.

As a result of the deliberations, five employees of the state highway department will be out of a job. Among these is E. J. Cantine, formerly state highway engineer. Those retained by the commission are G. Ed Ross, auditor and temporary secretary; R. H. Coppock, draughtsman; A. H. Davies and Charles C. Gerkey, W. J. Schofield, J. H. Scott and John Shans, draughtsmen; Lewis W. Metzger, designing engineer; S. H. Probert, leading engineer; Pearl Davis, foreman of the Siskiyou work; D. F. Greuner and M. O. Bennett, with a party of five working in Morrow county.

The Three Districts.  
It was decided to approve of the payroll of the old commission from the time the new law became effective until the employees were either discharged or re-appointed.

To facilitate the work of the commission the state was divided into three parts, like unto ancient Gaul. The counties assigned to the commissioners are as follows:

Commissioner Adams will have charge of all of western Oregon except the counties assigned to Commissioner Benson. Commissioner Benson will have charge of Lincoln, Polk, Tillamook, Yamhill, Washington, Clatsop, Colum-

### Bomb Plotters Are Held Without Bail

Hoboken, N. J., March 7.—Fritz Kolb, German reservist and Hans Schwartz, alleged German bomb plotters, were held without bail when arraigned this afternoon before Recorder Carsten.

The technical charge against them is, Multnomah, Clackamas, Hood River and Wasco counties. The counties assigned to Commissioner Thompson comprise all of eastern Oregon except Klamath, Hood River and Wasco counties.

Petitions for highway work will be sent to Secretary Ross, at Salem, who will notify the commissioner from whose territory the application comes. This commissioner will then investigate the matter of the petition, arrange a hearing and place it all before the commission.

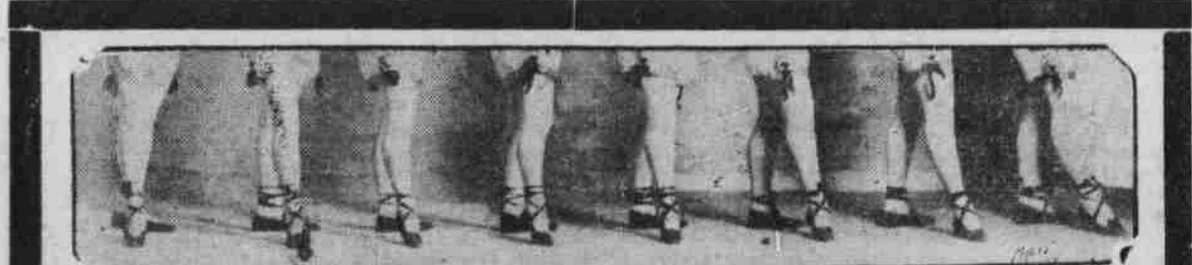
