STONE WILL RETAIN PLACE ON COMMITTEE

"Senatorial Courtesy" Forbids Other Senators Administering Rebuke

New York, March 9.—Because of the time honored "senatorial courtesy," the New York World declared today Senator Stone probably will be retained as chairman of the foreign relations committee.

The World made this statement following a poll of the senate by its Washington correspondent, in which it was found that only three senators would express themselves in favor of Stone's removal...

What the World Says: Commenting on Stone's position the World said editorially: "A senate which by nearly unanimous vote of democrats and republicans has just rid itself forever of shackling rules imposed by a generation long dead..."

The Times said: "Admitting for the sake of argument that Mr. Stone may be a great statesman, the greatest in American history even, admitting that his talents are so various and so dazzling that the government could not get along without him..."

A Senator's Statement: "You may say definitely," Lewis said, "that Mr. Stone will again head the committee."

COURT-HOUSE NEWS State House News

Complaint was filed yesterday by Arch W. Schiedel against J. E. Sutherland for the collection of three sums of money, which he alleges is due him for services rendered.

Thomas Mathers was granted a default decree yesterday in the action brought by him against Charles B. and Margaret Ward for the foreclosure of a mortgage.

Fortunato Monteleone filed a petition for citizenship papers yesterday with the circuit court. He states he was born in sunny Italy in 1893 and arrived in New York August 9, 1907.

With the arrival of the first of April shortly and the opening of the fishing season, hunters and fisher's licenses are being issued by the county clerk in considerable numbers.

An order for the payment of two amounts of \$27.60 each by Grover C. Bellinger, the guardian of Blanche Case and Nettie Harrison, was granted yesterday by the circuit court to E. D. Harrison.

Numerous complaints have been sent in to the department of weights and measures concerning shortage in the measurement of cords of wood supplied people in this city by farmers with the result that the department has had the wood measured and in some cases found it wanting.

This has been done recently and it has been found that in numerous cases that the wood delivered has been short of the required 128 cubic feet.

"Buy wood by the cord or fractional part thereof; ordering 'by the load' is meaningless. A 'load' of wood loaded in a small wagon might consist of less than half a cord, and yet be a large load for that particular wagon."

In this connection, wood dealers and consumers are advised that this office recognizes a "shrinkage" of twelve cubic feet to the cord when wood is sawed; or, in other words, one cord of four foot wood (128 cubic feet), carefully piled, and then sawed into 16-inch lengths and repiled will measure 116 cubic feet in the short lengths; consequently, if you order one cord with the request that it be sawed, the delivery of 116 cubic feet of the sawed wood will comply with your order.

In reply to a query from G. G. Brown, clerk of the state land board, concerning a request of the United States government to make up a deficit of base for which the state has received indemnity lands from the government, and also whether in case the land board refused to make substitution the government could cancel the selection by appropriate action in the federal courts, the attorney general replied that he thought the state was bound to make up the deficit and that in case it did not the government could maintain suit.

In his opinion, the attorney general stated that Oregon has received indemnity lands amounting to 5642.24 acres more than the valid base submitted therefor. He said it is only a matter of common right that the state should supply the amount of base necessary to make up this deficiency.

Articles of incorporation filed with the corporation commissioner today are as follows: Portland Maternity Hospital with a capital of \$5000 filed to own, equip, or operate a maternity hospital in Portland.

The Newberg Hop company filed with a capital of \$5000 for the purpose of selling hops, farm, and dairy produce in Portland. The incorporators are Charles M. Metzler, J. B. Metzler and Robert H. Down.

Certificate of decrease of capital stock of the Killimaine Lake Reservoir and Rock Creek Irrigation company from \$25,000 to \$10,000 was filed.

Attorney General Brown yesterday afternoon filed two ballot titles for measures to be voted on by the people at the coming special election on June 4. The titles were filed with Secretary of State Olcott, and cover senate bill 317, appropriating \$200,000 for the construction of a state school for defective and dependent children, and house joint resolution No. 4, establishing and maintaining a normal school in southern Oregon and another in eastern Oregon, each to cost \$125,000.

Senate bill No. 317, establishing dependent, delinquent and defective children's home appropriating money therefor. Appropriating the sum of \$200,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary to establish a home to be known as "The Home for State Wards," for dependent, delinquent and defective children, who shall be committed to said home by lawful authority of the state, authorizing the state board of control to acquire a site and to take real estate for said home at some point within the city of Portland, or within five miles from the corporate limits of said city, and to construct buildings and provide necessary equipment therefor, including furnishing, lighting and heating.

C. E. Durkee, employed in the state highway department as a draughtsman, tendered his resignation yesterday with the probable intention of entering the employ of a private firm in Portland. He was one of the men retained by the new commission as a result of its first meeting this week. A successor has not yet been chosen.

Ships Are Armed. After the White House announcement the navy department announced that "we are prepared as to gunners as well as guns."

Secretary Daniels made the specific request upon the press of the country that for obvious reasons of national safety, newspapers refrain from announcing when a ship is armed, what ship is armed and where it is bound.

PRESIDENT CALLS

The proclamation of the president calling for an extra session reads as follows: "Whereas, Public interests require that the congress of the United States should be convened in extra session at 12 o'clock noon on the sixteenth day of April, 1917, to receive such communications as may be made by the executive; Now, therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim and declare that an extraordinary session requires the congress of the United States to convene in extra session at the capitol in the City of Washington on the sixteenth day of April, 1917, at 12 o'clock noon, of which all persons who shall at that time be entitled to act as members thereof are hereby required to take notice."
