SOME FIERCE FIGHTING ON WESTERN FRONT

French Attacks Repulsed—German's Take Prisoners in East

Berlin, via Sayville wireless, March 8.—French forces strongly attacked German positions south of Ripont, taken by the Germans February 15 and entered isolated trenches on height 185. They were repulsed and a counter attack brought back the French sections on the hill into German possession, but a farm on lowland is still held by the enemy.

In reporting this battle today the German official report revealed a vast amount of general fighting throughout the western front. The statement said: "Again artillery activity increased on a broad front, but only in Champagne was it confined to artillery. Whenever fire on other parts of the front was intensified, it was for preparation of our own or hostile minor fighting actions."

"West of Wyszchaete our storming detachments entered into an English position and returned with 37 prisoners, two machine guns and one mine thrower. "On the Somme sector there were repeated clashes of reconitering detachments. Fifteen Englishmen remained as prisoners in our hands."

Captured Six Hundred Berlin, via Sayville wireless, March 9.—Four officers and six hundred men of ranks were taken prisoners with several machine guns and mine throwers in German successes achieved against Russian forces in the storming of positions on the edge of Magyaros (Rumanian front), the war office announced today.

"Between the Trots and Uz valleys our troops stormed the height of the ridge of Magyaros and the neighboring strongly entrenched positions of the Russians," the statement said. "Four officers, six hundred of ranks and several machine guns and mine throwers were captured."

Mrs. Hartley Killed. Salenka, March 9.—Mrs. Hartley, a sister of Lord French, commander-in-chief of the British home defense corps, died at Monastir from a wound received when a shell struck an ambulance to which she was attached.

The Yarrowdale Prisoners. Washington, March 9.—The state department has addressed two inquiries to Germany for information about release of the American Yarrowdale prisoners and the detention of four American consuls in Germany.

French Make Good Gains. Paris, March 9.—French forces yesterday registered an important victory on the front between Maison Chamagne and Dunsmuir, carrying all German positions on a front of 1920 yards and to a depth of from 650 to 860 yards, today's war office statement declared.

One hundred and thirty-six German prisoners were captured and a counter attack made late in the evening with grenades was repulsed, the enemy losing heavily.

Around Verdun two German attacks at Avocourt wood trenches were repulsed by the French fire.

To Invoke Referendum On Fishing Bill Preparation for invoking the referendum on senate bill 96, by Gill, which placed the dead line for commercial fishing about three miles below the falls at Oregon City are being made and a copy of a proposed referendum petition was filed yesterday with Secretary of State O'Leary.

BRITISH TRANSPORT SUNK London, March 9.—Ten Europeans and 615 African native laborers perished when the British transport Men-of-war sunk after a collision February 21, the war office announced today.
