Shelter of Repairmen Is Declared Inadequate

O. P. Hoff, state tabor commissioner, recently investigated the condition of the machine shop of the Southern Pacific company at Brooklyn, and found that the shelter for the repairmen inadequate to give them the protection required under the law. Accordingly, this morning he sent out the following letter to F. L. Burckhalter, superintend-ent of the Southern Pacific company:

"You are therefore notified that a shed sufficiently large to give protec-tion to all of your repairmen in the yard must be constructed. Realizing that it will take some time to complete, the plans and perform the preliminary work, 30 days will be given you from date of this notice to do such work. On or before the end of 30 days, or April 16, the construction of such shed as required under the above quoted sec-tion of the Oregon law must be actually commenced.*
