C. B. Stone Is Elected Mayor of Dallas City

Dallas, Or., April 4.--The annual city election of Dallas, held Monday, resulted as follows: Mayor, C. B. Stone; councilman at large, Tracy Staats, auditor and police judge, J. T. Ford; councilman first ward, P. S. Greenwood, Sr.; second ward, J. M. Card; third ward, Walter Muir. The contested offices were those of police judge and councilman for the first ward. Charles Gregory, the present auditor and police judge, was defeated by Mr. Ford by 198 votes. J. M. Sweeney, for councilman, was beaten by Greenwood by 28 votes. The amendment to the city charter, providing that annual city elections shall be held in December instead of in April, carried.
