MUNITION CARRYING SCHOONER IS ASHORE

Destroyers Chase Her and She Is Beached On Mexican Coast

San Diego, Cal., April 11.—Although navy officials and United States secret service men here today denied knowledge of a reported clash between two United States torpedo boats and a munitions-carrying schooner off the west coast on Monday, it is known that stores of munitions in California ports have been care ally watched recently.

According to reports reaching here today, the munitions schooner, bound for a Mexican port, was driven in shore by the torpedo boats. The captain attempted to beach the schooner and torpedo boats opened fire, but the vessel was on the beach before any damage was done by the shells.

The munitions, according to reports, were then taken aboard the destroyers and returned to a Pacific port. There were several hundred rounds of ammunition, it is said.
