New York, April 17.—Coal miners and operators of the bituminous field who, in separate conferences today, reached an agreement for a 20 per cent wage increase, went into joint conference shortly after 3 o'clock this afternoon to ratify the agreement and place themselves on record supporting the war. It was understood the joint conference would vote to speed up coal production and appoint a permanent committee of five miners and five operators to cooperate with the government in every way possible.
