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PRESS CENSORSHIP BILL STARTS FIGHT

Press Should Be Free to Print Anything Not Aiding the Enemy

Washington, April 19.—The fight in the senate against the administration's proposed drastic newspaper censorship regulations which form part of the espionage measure continued unabated today.

Emboldened by the bitter denunciations of the suggested censorship by Senators Lodge, Brandegee, Thomas, Johnson and others, its opponents today flatly declared if the bill passes unchanged, "it would make the press of the nation the virtual tool of the government."

Such a law, these men declared, would completely muzzle all publications in the matter of comment or criticism of the plans or policies of the government.

Lodge reiterated his charge that "under the bill newspapers could not print anything that the administration didn't want them to print."

Livelest debate since the war program of legislation started has been stirred up by the censorship clause.

An amendment designed to permit newspapers to print any information "except that useful to the enemy," was put forward by Lodge. Thomas was preparing another amendment aimed at the same object.

"This bill puts into the hands of the president and his departments to decide the liberties of the people," Thomas declared. "I'd rather have no law at all than this monstrous law."

Lodge took a fling at the committee of public information appointed by the president by declaring:

"We are told that a board of censorship has been appointed to act as censors of the press of the United States. It puts absolutely into the hands of the heads of the two departments that are to conduct the war the power to send to prison any man who criticizes their administration, although not giving information to the enemy."

"There is a very broad distinction between what is useful to the enemy and what the head of a department says in his opinion he thinks might be useful to the enemy. The president can not attend to every case that comes up—he has to rely upon those very department heads who are most likely to be criticised."

The "Through the Telescope" was the general theme of the Websterian society's meeting last night. Sylvester Burleigh in a talk, "Possibilities in the Pacific," presented two good ideas. One was the industrial possibilities of the Pacific slope, how they might be affected by the war. The other was the probability of warfare on the Pacific ocean. The part that the German submarine could play in this field of action was clearly analyzed.

Harold Dimmick in his talk on "Japan and America," presented the difficulties in the way of United States regulation of oriental immigration. Blaine Bedingfield presented some "Monroe Doctrine Difficulties."

The Websterian trio composed of Gus Anderson, Paul Anderson and Laban Steeves favored the society with three humorous selections. Parliamentary practice was conducted by Oscar Olson.

Railroad to Siletz and Yaquina Will Be Extended

Dallas, Ore., April 19.—The Valley & Siletz Railway company will begin the construction of another 10-mile stretch of its road in the spring. their strength in trying to hold to the line; they apparently realize it cannot be expected the exhausted German troops will be able to face the terrific French artillery fire in offensive operations.

Paris, via London, April 19.—French attacks in a great offensive with ambitious objects have so far failed to attain those ends, although some tactical advantage has been gained by the enemy, today's official statement asserted.

"On Tuesday night," the war office reported, "a local attack near Bray succeeded. Near Ville Au Bois, where our position became unsuitable, we established our forces to the rear of the line of fortifications. Attacks at Chemin Des Dunes and especially violent ones near Craonne sanguinarily failed."

"Officials orders found indicate indicate how far reaching were the objects of the French attack on Monday. The French commands did not realize them at any point practically, and only approximately attained their tactical objects."

Paris, April 19.—Capture of Mont-Haut and several heights, including Hill 227 in further progress of the great Champagne offensive, was announced in today's French official statement.

course which the republic's very large German population would adopt. More than ten days ago dispatches said that under cover of needing troops to avert an outbreak in an old boundary dispute between two Brazilian states.

The government had dispatched very strong forces to the states where the Germans were most numerous.

All Alien Enemies Must Give Up Arms to Sheriff at Once

The man who is not a citizen of the United States is an alien, even if he has lived here 50 years. Hence he is not in the present war conditions, privileged to enjoy all the benefits of a citizen.

And more than that, regardless of the number of years he has lived in the United States, he will be regarded as an alien by the sheriff and officers.

By the proclamation of the president of the United States, it is unlawful for alien enemies, and this means those who owe their allegiance to Germany, Austria, Bulgaria or Turkey, to have in their possession any firearms, weapons, or implements of war, or a component part thereof. Nor can the alien lawfully possess ammunition, machine silencer, bomb, or explosive, or even the materials used in the manufacture of explosives.

Nor can these aliens possess any signalling device, cipher code, or any books printed or written in cipher or in which there may be invisible writing.

On the 18th of April, 1917, Max Gehlar, as district attorney, posted notices to this effect, and if within 24 hours after the date any alien having above named articles in his possession, is subject to arrest.

An alien is one who has not taken out his final naturalization papers. Hence it is up to all aliens to at once surrender their firearms and ammunition to the sheriff. If they are surrendered voluntarily, they will be returned at the close of the war by the sheriff. If found in the possession of aliens, they will be forfeited to the United States.

Home Guard Company Is Organized at Hubbard

Hubbard, Ore., April 19.—W. H. Barrett was elected captain, K. B. Grim, first lieutenant, and Asa McCallister, second lieutenant, of a company of home guards organized at Hubbard Sunday afternoon. Captain Barrett and Second Lieutenant McCallister saw service during the Spanish-American war, and First Lieutenant Grim had training at O. A. C. The call to the men was issued by Lieutenant Grim to organize for drill and to offer their services to the state when needed.

Hubbard is well represented in Company 1, 3rd Oregon, and the members of the Home Guard, eligible to serve, will have the benefit of the drill when other regiments are formed. Fifty men signed up. Drill will begin as soon as Captain Barrett receives the latest manual from headquarters.

He is connected with the Tanqueray Film Corporation of New Rochelle, New York, and has written to a friend in Salem regarding the photoplays in which he is to appear.

Mr. Warde is now engaged in producing Shakespeare's tragedy of "King Lear," which will be released by the Tanqueray Film company through the Pathe Exchange. In this picturization of King Lear, Frederick Warde takes the part of the rugged, old semi-barbaric king. In his letter to his Salem friend, Mr. Warde writes:

And right on top of this bad news comes the announcement that jobbers are limiting dealers to orders of 1,000 pounds.

Flour is worth on the present market \$12.20 a barrel for the very best. This may be the price quoted by every grocer, but this is the right retail price if bought on the present market. Evidently, the good housekeeper will soon be obliged to figure on calories and protein and feed the family accordingly.
