

"WILLAMETTE" TO ISSUE 44 DIPLOMAS

Liberal Arts and Law College Increase—Commencement Planned

Four diplomas will be granted at the spring commencement exercises at the university held June 10, 11 and 12. The largest class is from the law school. Its number is 11 while the college of music and Kimball college. One master of arts degree was given.

The college of law shows the greatest increase over last year, when only three degrees were given. In the liberal arts department there is an increase of 10 over the number last year being 30. As a result of the one master's degree to be granted, there were four last spring. William M. A. is the person to be honored with the M. A.

Henry Savage and Henry Gregg will receive diplomas from both the law and

liberal arts departments. Gregg completed both courses in four years. Four members of the liberal arts class are enlisted in Company M. They are Willis Bartlett, Arnold Gralapp, Karl Chapler and Maxwell Ball. The latter completed his course at the close of the first semester. Several of the senior laws have already passed the state bar examinations.

The commencement week program is as yet immaterial. But since all students except the seniors will have final exams during the commencement days, more elaborate affairs are being planned by the class, since more students will be here. Formerly few students remained for the exercises. Present plans have set aside June 9 as baccalaureate Sunday. President Doney may speak at this service. Monday, June 10, will be a relatively quiet day, the annual senior breakfast is scheduled for the morning, and the president's reception for the evening. Tuesday will be class day. The events will include the presentation of the senior gift, the senior play at night, student feed, and the several class stunts in the afternoon. Wednesday is commencement day proper. The address will be given in the forenoon at the First M. E. church. That evening the alumni banquet at the Marion hotel will conclude the passing of the class of 1917 into the alumni ranks.

OREGON STATE SHOOT COMPLETED TODAY

Began Yesterday, Ends With Meeting at Marion Hotel Tonight

Sunday, May 6, opened the Fifth Annual Oregon State Shoot of the Oregon State Sportsmen's association, held on the grounds of the Capital City Rod and Gun club near the state fair grounds. Yesterday was practice day and the chief feature was the Honeyman Diamond trophy.

This morning ushered in the main event, which will take the greater part of the day to shoot off. Complete records of today's scores will not be available until about six o'clock this evening when the birds have all been shot.

The schedule this morning began with ten events of fifteen birds each, the entrance fee for each of which is \$1.50. This was followed by the Oregon State Sportsmen's association event, with 25 targets on a 16-yard rise, which is open to amateurs of the state of Oregon only. The high gun receives the trophy and ownership is permanent.

This is followed by the special team shoot of 25 targets, three men to the team with an entrance fee of \$1 per man. Each member in the winning team is to receive a trophy.

This evening at the Marion Hotel, the annual meeting of the Oregon Sportsmen's association will be held, at eight o'clock.

Honeyman Trophy

The shoot for the Honeyman Hardware diamond trophy remained unsettled when the last bird was broken yesterday.
