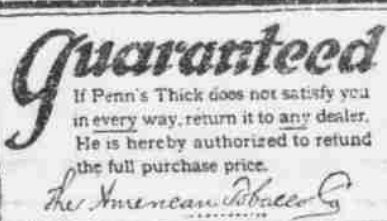

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON DAY WILL BE OBSERVED

Friday, April 11, Will Be Observed by Many Towns Throughout State

Friday, April 11, will be University of Oregon day, and plans for its observance are being made in all the principal towns, where former students and graduates reside. In Salem the local alumni association will meet tonight to formulate plans for properly observing the event.

In Roseburg and Albany committees have charge and are making arrangements to properly celebrate the day. The Roseburg Review says:

"Under the direction of local committees of alumni in every section of the state, the friends and former students of the University of Oregon are arranging for a celebration next Friday of the first state wide 'University day,' as recently set aside by special proclamation issued by Governor Withycombe. The chairman in charge of the arrangements for Douglas county is Walter Fisher, of Roseburg. The heads of other committees in this county are: Drain, Ben Huntington; Glendale, H. R. Marsh; Oakland, Anthony Jauregui; Oakland, Alfred Powers; Sutherlin, Mildred Waite; Yonahville, Mary Striker."

"In each community in Oregon the alumni expect to get together all persons who have ever studied at the university or taken work through correspondence. The program for the day will consist in three parts: First, the effecting of a closer organization; second, the celebration of the day in good fellowship, with banquets, picnics and speeches in the different communities as local convenience may dictate; and third, the carrying out of some work for the university. One of the branches of the university activity which it is hoped to forward is the campaign for the women's building, which has been conducted for over a year under the leadership of Mrs. George Gerlinger of Dallas."

GERMAN PEACE OFFER

aided the exigencies of the situation justified it.

World Get Rid of Russia. "Relaxation of American preparedness would increase the contempt of powerful Germans toward the United States," Egan declared. "Advices from Hamburg, Stettin and elsewhere in Germany prove that although food conditions are bad everywhere, still the people are sanguine of victory and are willing to make further sacrifices."

"Any peace suggestions by Germany at this time merely aim to eliminate Russia as a military force and to obtain the Russian border. The Germans—especially those in Berlin—regard American military preparations as a bluff."

"There is no danger of debasement of the Hohenzollerns in Germany. Let me emphasize—peace talk in America will only prolong the war."

"Germany will have constitutional reforms—perhaps in the near future. But there isn't the slightest reason for believing that such reforms will impose the czar's fate on the kaiser and his line."

Press Deceives Them. "The German reptile press has induced the German populace with the belief that victory is simply a question of time. The German populace is willing to fight and wait."

Every American here who knows German conditions is eager that the people of the United States be warned in advance of the hollow promises of German professions for peace. They hold peace proposals are part of the whole German plot to gain time—and in the meanwhile Germany still hopes to win by her submarine warfare. They predict careful dissemination of any formal peace plans or war aims which may be announced will reveal them utterly insincere although on their face they may hint at great concessions. The best brains of Germany are now believed to be working on a list of war aims which Imperial Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg is announced as about to state to the reichstag.

New Development.

Private advices received from Ger-

man today showed this new development in the German government's peace "plotting." They detailed an empire-wide hunt for "peace spies."

The hunt has been transferred from the civil authorities and placed in the hands of the military government with rewards offered for arrests of peace propagandists.

The German government appears determined that, if there is any peace talk, it must be the government and not the German people who do the talking. Information here indicated a widespread plan to carry the peace movement to the German people and repressive measures by the government. Meanwhile, the people of the German provinces especially are puzzled to understand why England is as nearly broken and defeated as the government claims, she is still making war and not hearkening to "peace feelers."

The result has been, according to advices here, that a formidable wave of dissatisfaction against the German autocracy is sweeping over Germany. There is absolutely no evidence, however, that this dissatisfaction and desire for peace are sufficiently strong to have any serious effect on the policy of the German government or the military aristocrats.

The "peace spies" who are now being hunted down are said to be Germans exclusively. There is no hint that Germany's enemies are engaged in her borders in such propaganda—and least of all that Americans are aiding.

Very few German newspapers are being received here now but all which do pass the censorship contain enthusiastic articles rejoicing in the success of the German submarine warfare. All feature widely stories from British newspapers detailing food shortage in England and discussion in the British parliament as well as of plans for American aid.
