RUSSIA AWAKES

(Continued from page one.)

"The government's attitude in the political situation was outlined on May 8," the proclamation said, "to this, M. Gutchkoff subscribed. It was frankly stated then that the state was endangered and that it was necessary to utilize all forces to avert that danger. Without waiting for a solution of the question, Gutchkoff deemed it feasible to divest himself of responsibility. The provisional government is remaining at its post, considering it has no right to lay down the burden."

Generals Resign

Petrograd, May 15.—Generals Brusiloff and Gourko tendered their resignations today. They have not yet been accepted.

Brusiloff has been generally regarded as the most notable of all the Russian generals. He was in command of Russia's most successful offensive—that by which the Austrians were driven out of Przemysl and Galicia. He has been in command of Russia's southeastern army since last June.

Presumably his resignation and that of General Gourko, a division commander in Galicia, is due to exactly the same causes as those which brought about the resignation earlier in the week of Minister of War Gutchkoff and General Korniloff, commandant of the Petrograd garrison—refusal to continue in charge of the army while hampered by workmen's and soldiers' committee's orders.

Brusiloff's resignation may be considered exceedingly serious, as indicating the withdrawal from the army of one of its most talented military commanders.

Hollweg Refused to Talk.

London, May 15.—German Imperial Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg refused to discuss Germany's war aims in the reichstag today, according to a wireless message from Berlin received here late today.

The chancellor refused to answer interpellations on Germany's peace aspirations, declaring such a statement "would not serve the interests of Germany."

Italy's Offensive Grows.

Rome, May 15.—Italy's general offensive is apparently well under way. The official statement from the war office today declared:

"From Tolmino to the sea our artillery fire was intense. Our infantry attacked and made considerable progress in the Piana area, on the slopes of Mount Oveco and on the hills to the west of Gorizia and Verlobizza."

The German Version.

Berlin, via London, May 15.—German forces stormed and captured St. Berthe farm, east of Fort Malinissau near Monchy, today's official statement declared. English attacks around Monchy were broken down in annihilating fire.


