Socialist Kerensky New Minister of War Commands Respect of All

By William G. Shepherd, (United Press Staff Correspondent.) Petrograd, May 21.—It appeared today that the Lloyd George of Russia had been found. He is A. F. Kerensky, minister of war and marine under the new coalition cabinet which is uniting all factions into a harmonious administration.

On the first day in his new post, Kerensky's energy was manifest by two forceful appeals to the people to fight the right fight. Orders to the troops and the sailors indicated the new war head would exert implicit discipline. A speech which he delivered to members of the peasants' congress was an eloquent plea for "a last heroic effort."

"Let us show the world," he urged, "that we not only know how to destroy, but to create."

A meeting of duma members yesterday adopted resolutions warning the new government it was essential there should be "absolute, unshaken loyalty to our allies, for interests vital to the honor of the country are vitally bound up with this loyalty."

Newspaper Will Be Issued by Censors

Copies of the "Official Bulletin" issued by the censors for the federal government have been received by the Capital Journal. The publication is intended for the information of the general public regarding what information should be kept secret and to give information regarding war activities of various branches of the government.

The war loan, navy recruiting operations and the Red Cross are given publicity in the current issue. An unusual feature in connection with this publication is the announcement of the subscription price "\$5 a year," indicating that it is to be a sort of official government newspaper for general circulation.

The bulletin is an eight-page publication with a number of articles on government affairs.

RUSH CONSTRUCTION OF 24 MINE SWEEPERS

Will Be Powerful Vessels of 1,000 Tons—Will Act With British Fleet

Washington, May 21.—To speed up construction of 24 combination mine sweepers and sea going tugs, Secretary Daniels today conferred with a delegation of 12 ship builders representing all of the principal ship building yards in the country. Daniels explained the necessity of quick work on the boats and called upon the ship builders for aid.

He assured the builders that the government would co-operate with them in procuring labor and material. Already the government has arranged to furnish certain plates and other steel needed by expediting shipment.

The new mine sweepers will be of 1,000 tons. They are to be sturdy, powerful boats. Although officials refused to comment, it was said the new boats might be used to co-operate with the British fleet of mine sweepers.

After their conference with Daniels, the ship builders met Admiral Griffin, with whom they went over in greater detail the plans for construction of the ships. At a later conference with Daniels the method of payment for the new fleet was talked over. The government
