holm meeting was called by German socialists and that German interests would dominate the sessions, led some neutral delegates privately to express the belief today that attendance of allied socialists was fraught with considerable peril to them personally.

Americans in Stockholm pointed out as likely to increase the suspicion of allied nations that the Stockholm conference was a German move, that the German government has credentialled all its delegates; that Austrian and Bulgarian representatives are here and that the Turkish legation has specifically designated Turkey's committee. The central powers, therefore, are all represented. So far it appears certain that only the Russian delegates of the allies will be on hand.

If little is being said about the Fourth of July in these days, it is mostly because so much is being done about it.

FRENCH COMMISSION HAS REACHED PARIS

Voluntary Censorship of American Papers Kept Their Departure Secret

Paris, May 23.—Marshal Joffre and former Premier Viviani arrived in Paris this evening, completing their mission to the United States.

Marshal Joffre, Vice-Premier Viviani and other members of the French war commission sailed from New York May 15. Their departure was kept such a close secret under the voluntary censorship that it was generally believed the Frenchmen were still in Washington. They sailed on the same steamer that brought them over.

After Viviani's flying trip to Canada and Joffre's visit to Boston, the commissioners met at Baltimore the afternoon of May 14, made a dash to Washington for their official farewells to President Wilson, then went to New York on a special train.

Reaching New York shortly before midnight, the commissioners boarded tugs and were taken to their ship. When the vessel sailed out it was believed she was en route to Hampton Roads to pick up Joffre and the others there.

FRENCH ADVANCE

Early today all the remaining portions of Cornillet were consolidated—including an immense tunnel which the Germans had laboriously dug out under the mount.

German soldiers captured by the French advance declared today Field Marshal Von Hindenburg personally visited the Cornillet front recently and supervised all arrangements for the abortive offensive.

This tunnel under Mount Cornillet gave the French some troublesome days of fighting. The Germans hid their reserves in it and from its depths they frequently poured these forces out just as the French succeeded in overcoming the German lines. This sudden reinforcement of the enemy would push the French back. The original French assault on the mount made May 2 was thus thrown back at the moment of victory.

In the tunnel as it was captured today the French found an entire German battalion, including a staff major.

French Gains Important.

Paris, May 23.—General Nivelle's resumed offensive today won for French forces complete domination of the Ailette valley, capture of three German lines of trenches east of Chevreux and other advances on the sector from the plateau of Vauclere to Califormie.

The French official statement detailed the offensive as being thus successfully presented in three "violent attacks" at different parts of this front. "The attacks were most successful," the statement said. "From the plateau Vauclere to Califormie the French captured all commanding points dominating the Ailette valley and also achieved splendid progress on the northern slopes.

In the region east of Chevreux we captured three German lines of trenches in the course of the night and smashed a German counter attack on the new position by heavy fire, the enemy losing heavily. Three hundred and fifty prisoners were taken.

Around Epajoges a German attack failed."

Lull on British Front.

London, May 23.—Another lull seemed to prevail on the British front today. Field Marshal Haig's report indicated heavy German bombardment of positions on the Hindenburg line finally held by the British, with a return of British shells, but otherwise only isolated fighting.

Around Bullecourt throughout the evening and night our positions on the Hindenburg line were heavily bombarded," the statement said. "Our artillery replied vigorously. No hostile attacks developed.

Southeast of Gavrelle early this morning we carried out a successful raid. A number of Germans were killed. Our forces returned without casualties.

"North of Armentieres we took a few prisoners as a result of patrol encounters at various points."

Hail Pershing's Coming.

(United Press staff correspondent.) With the British Armies in the Field, May 23.—The Tommies got word today that General Pershing's seasoned veterans were soon to be fighting with them.

"Well, the Kaiser's got another disagreeable surprise coming to him," remarked one mud-covered bombardier from the front trenches as he rolled back of the lines for rest. "He probably didn't figure on how quickly the United States could put forces into the fight."

Everywhere along the front soldiers and officers alike hailed the news of the Pershing expedition with delight.

Prussian guns were busy in the Ypres region today and there was a small British raid in the neighborhood of Villers-Guislain. Otherwise there was no big fighting.

The German Statement.

Berlin, via London, May 23.—"A heavy sanguinary blow," was inflicted on the French in the repulse of their attacks from Laville to Aux Bois, today's official statement declared. The assaults were made in the morning and repeated again in the evening, being marked by stubborn hand to hand fighting.

The statement said fighting was "limited" between the Aisne and the Champagne during the morning and afternoon.
