EMERGENCY BOARD PLAYS STRONG HAND

Grants \$1,000 to Child Wel-
fare Commission—Still
Wrestling with Business

With Governor Withycombe, Speaker Stanfield of the house of representatives, President Gus Mosher of the senate, Chairman Kubli of the house ways and means committee, Dr. Wood of the senate ways and means committee, Treasurer Kay, and Secretary of State Olcott present, the state emergency board, which was convened to consider the appropriation of money to continue investigations of the alleged land fraud cases of the Pacific Livestock company of Harney county, met this morning in the public hearing room in the state house at ten thirty o'clock.

Attorney General Brown and G. G. Brown were also present. Edward Treadwell, of San Francisco, of the Miller and Lax land corporation, represented the Pacific Livestock company. C. B. McConnel, in whose name the case has been brought, was present.

The first business that came before the emergency board was the letter of Secretary Trumbull, of the child welfare commission, who asked for \$1,000 with which to conduct the office according to the plans mapped out. The claim arose over a misprint or clerical error in printing the session laws in that the appropriation read \$3,000 instead of the \$4,000 as authorized by the legislature.

Representative Kubli stated that the statements of Secretary Trumbull regarding the finances of the commission, were correct and that while there is no deficiency existing at present there will be within a short time. He moved that the request be granted, and it was unanimously carried.

The Governor Talked.
Governor Withycombe then addressed the board on the matter of national crisis and how the state of Oregon was prepared to meet it. He said the nation at this time was in a serious conflict and that many emergencies might arise.

He said the legislature, either fortunately or unfortunately, had adjourned before the crisis became so serious as to demand attention. He stated that as the legislatures of other states are in session and have made provision for meeting emergencies as they may arise by appropriations which are under the direction of the chief executive.

Oregon has not a dollar appropriated for meeting any emergency, according to the governor's statement.

On advice of the federal authorities he said the state council of defense had been organized. But it has no funds. The governor suggested that if the board saw fit, he thought it would be a good thing to authorize the state executive to incur reasonable expenditures. He said the attorney general was of the opinion that in war time the constitutional provisions would be elastic enough to allow such authorization.

Speaker Stanfield, as a member of the State Council of Defense, stated they had met and organized but they were without funds. He said they decided to contribute funds from their own pockets to maintain an office and a secretary. However, he thought it would be wise to have some financial backing from official sources.

He declared they were all eager to do all they can to coordinate and harmonize all efforts. He declared there was an outstanding field open and that it was necessary to have some head, some clearing-house for conserving effort.

A Question of Law.
Treasurer Kay said there was no question but that every member there was in favor of granting authority for the expenditures, but he questioned the legality of the board to grant such authority.

President Mosher said the matter was such as to deserve serious consideration and moved that a committee of three be appointed to draft a suitable resolution. The motion was carried and the governor appointed Speaker Stanfield, President Mosher, and Representative Kubli on the committee. They are to report this afternoon.

Following this business, the matter of the Pacific Livestock company was brought up and Edward Treadwell, of San Francisco, presented its case. He said there were three things that were fair to the company and they were:

First, that the state of Oregon should not allow C. B. McConnel to use the state as a means of punishing his personal enemies; second, that the state should come into court with the case and not spend money for investigation; and third, that money should not be asked merely for investigating the Pacific Livestock company but that the attorney general should go to the legislature and ask for a sum sufficient to cover all the litigation of his office.

He took up the charges made against the company by McConnel and denied them and declared that they were made as a campaign of hate against the company. Regarding the statement that the company spent little money in Oregon he said that in 1916 the company spent \$221,000 in Oregon, \$18 in California, and \$3,000 in eastern states for products that could not be purchased in the state.

His arguments were interrupted by the noon hour.

WILL RECOMMEND PEANKING S. P. BRIDGE

Committee Finds Ferry Service Inadequate—Planking Bridge Is Only Solution

The bridge committee appointed several months ago to report on the ferry service across the river, and also as to the advisability of planking the railroad bridge will report this evening. A meeting has been called at the Commercial club especially to hear the report of this committee.

There is a general feeling that the ferry proposition does not fill the bill for transportation between the two counties at this point. Manufacturers, canneries and business men have expressed the opinion that while the ferry relieves the situation somewhat at present, that with the fruit and canning season coming on as well as the harvest, the ferry or even two ferries will prove entirely inadequate. This refers also to state fair times.

The committee composed of Chas. A. Park, chairman; Fred W. Steunloff and E. G. Deckebach, at the session this evening will recommend that the Southern Pacific bridge be planked as the only means of solving the traffic problem. Permission to plank the bridge has been given by the S. P. officials, providing the counties of Marion and Polk have contracted for the building of a new bridge. The contract for the new bridge will be awarded as soon as the legal time for advertising for bids has elapsed, as the State Highway commission has drawn all the plans and placed them in the hands of Attorney General Brown to pass on the legal phase of the contracts.

The recommendation to plank the bridge will be presented to the Commercial club this evening and it is then up to the club for action.

Says Up To Citizens To Hustle Hard for Road Bond Issue

The campaign for the good roads measure to be voted on June 4, 17, has developed the fact that the centers of population are for the bonds and that the rural communities are adverse, for the reason that they are still uninformed in regard to the provisions of the proposed law.

Hundreds of farmers believe that it is going to add to their taxation. As a matter of fact it does not cause them to pay one additional cent of tax nor one additional dollar for auto licenses. They believe that this law provides for a system which will do away with road supervisors throughout the county. The word supervisor is not in this law and the law has nothing to do with them directly or indirectly.

The passage of the law means that the \$20,000, estimated annual expense of keeping up the Pacific highway at present, will be saved and will be used for the rural highways of the county, therefore the farmers are strong beneficiaries under this act. It is up to the citizens of Salem and the other towns of the county to fully explain these matters to the farmers who come in to trade, and to properly inform them concerning the true provisions of the measure.

It means much to this city for hundreds of men will be employed for the improvement of the Pacific highway and these men will patronize every business institution in this city. It means much to auto owners, in the saving of thousands and thousands of dollars in tire, gasoline and repairs and it is up to them to see to it that people they vote "YES" No. 314 on the ballot, follows as a matter of course.

The fact is, the passage of this law means untold millions in benefits to the city of Salem and to all the citizens of Marion county and each and every man and woman should hustle for the adoption of this law on June 4, 1917.

Former Asylum Inmate Sues for Big Damages

Winnie Springer, committed to the Oregon State Hospital for Multnomah county, this morning filed suit against Dr. R. E. L. Steiner, superintendent of the asylum, and Drs. L. F. Griffith and P. W. Byrd, assistant superintendents and physicians, for damages in the sum of \$10,000.

The complaint states that Winnie Springer was committed to the asylum on January 9, 1915, and kept there until May 31, 1915. She recently brought suit in Portland against the Asylum of officials and relatives for damages. The suit as to the officials was dismissed but she received judgment against relatives for placing her in the asylum, in the sum of \$2,500.

Some of the Allegations
The complaint states she is sane, and that while in the asylum was carelessly treated and considered as an insane person, and alleges it is the duty of the superintendent of the asylum and his assistants to make a careful diagnosis and examination of the mental and physical condition of the patients and to prescribe proper treatment. The complaint says they failed to diagnose her case or to prescribe proper treatment, or see that she had proper food.
