COMPERS ADVISE PURCHASE OF BONDS

Says Working Men Must Help Finance World Democracy's War

Washington, June 13.—Working men should buy at least one \$50 liberty bond and help "finance democracy's war," President Samuel Compers of the American Federation of Labor urged in a message to the laboring men of the country, through the United Press today. It follows:

By Samuel Compers, (Written for the United Press.)

On June 5th the manhood of this nation enrolled in the service of this republic. That registration day was the occasion when the nation began to mobilize its man power.

This week, ending tomorrow, the nation is making its second great effort in the war—to float the two billion dollar bond issue necessary that the men who pledged their lives have proper opportunities to defend those principles for which our dead free people entered this war.

We must not fail in any effort that concerns this war. It is the duty of every man, woman and child who can subscribe to this loan to world liberty and democracy to do so to the fullest extent of their ability.

All the workers may not be in a position to purchase a liberty loan bond of large denomination, but nearly all can make the safe and patriotic investment of a \$50 bond.

No one questions the loyalty and patriotism of the workers. They have responded splendidly and will give full patriotic service. I urge every worker and every organization of workers to take part in this splendid patriotic effort to finance democracy's war with the wealth of democracy.

GREEK KING QUILTS

In addition, the allied control will be such as to thwart any junction between Greek troops and the Teutonic forces.

The idea of a Grecian republic has been fomented for some time and the state department has had a request before it to recognize a Venizelist government in Greece.

The allies have been able to make this coup largely because of the removal of imperial pressure from Russia. When the czar was in power, the British and French found themselves blocked in their Greek dealings often because of his influences and friendship for Greece.

Whether it will be possible to actually use Greek troops to aid the allies is problematical. In any event the Greek situation is such now that the army cannot harass the British forces that might now be thrown northward to cut the Berlin-to-Bagdad railway.

IT TOOK FIFTY MILLIONS

Chicago, June 13.—W. A. Heath, chairman of the Chicago federal reserve bank announced shortly after noon today that the United States Steel Corporation had subscribed an additional \$25,000,000 in liberty bonds, bringing its total to \$50,000,000. Of this, \$12,000,000 was credited to the Chicago district and the balance to New York.

Seattle, Wash., June 13.—Spurgeon Wiseman and Agnes Warfield were married in an aeroplane here yesterday afternoon and taken on a honeymoon trip into the clouds.

Caused Little Surprise

Paris, June 13.—Little surprise and little excitement was caused in the Greek capital by King Constantine's renewed abdication, according to Athens dispatches received here today. Only a crowd of the curious and a few soldiers remained in the vicinity of the palace.

King Constantine himself urged that there be no disorder and asked his bodyguards and a crowd of 2,000 royalists who had assembled at the palace to acquiesce in his decision.

Fought Over It There

Los Angeles, Cal., June 13.—Batting over a heated argument which grew out of the abdication of King Constantine of Greece, half a hundred Greeks and Italians clashed in a bloody encounter at Ninth and Market streets early today.

The fight had assumed riot proportions when the police, flying squadrons were called out to quell the disturbance. Several arrests were made and a score were treated at the receiving hospital.

from French patrol boats in the outer harbor. Then the British troop ships hastily shifted their anchorage to allow the boat with its all-important cargo to dock at the principal wharf.

There a huge American flag was hung to the breeze from the highest part of the landing stage, while on the dock itself a brilliant, colorful assembly awaited, cheering so that their welcome must have been heard far out over the waters as the boat slowly nosed her way between the whistle shrieking and gun barking craft in the harbor.

All Were Represented

On the dock were British, French and Belgian officers, formally drawn up in rigid salute as General Pershing first put his foot on French soil and gave recognition to the flesh of America's determination to fight.

Rene Besaud, under secretary of war was the governmental representative at this notable scene. He arrived from Paris barely in time to scurry to the dock and shake hands with the American commander as he stepped ashore.

A small French boy, who elged forward in the crowds that greeted the American general, was noticed by Pershing. He wanted something and Pershing wanted to know what it was. He came forward and shyly shook hands with the big, smiling American and then asked him to sign an autograph album, proudly displaying the signatures which he had already obtained in it from Marshal Joffre and Field Marshal Haig. General Pershing stopped right there and signed the book.

At Paris, it was announced today, Pershing will make his headquarters in the Hotel Carlton until he selects start headquarters at the French front.

Paris Rejoices

Paris, June 13.—Major General Pershing, commander of the American expeditionary army to be, arrived at a French port today. He was accorded a tremendously enthusiastic reception by the townspeople.

Pershing is due in Paris this evening and the wildest preparations are being made to accord him a reception there which will fittingly mark France's gratitude for America's aid in the war.

The American general is to be formally welcomed by Vice Premier Viviani, Minister of War Painleve, Marshal Joffre and General Foch.

All Citizens Welcome On "Cherrian Special"

The Cherrian special train that is to carry the Cherrians to Portland to take part in the monster Rose Festival patriotic parade on Thursday afternoon, will leave the Oregon Electric depot at State and High streets at 12 o'clock noon, and arrive at 10th and Salmon streets, Portland, at about 1:40 p. m.

Any one desiring to go on this train is welcome to do so, as announced by the Cherrian transportation committee, and in fact it is the desire of the Cherrian organization that the train be well filled as it will be conspicuously labelled "Cherrian Special" and decorated for the occasion, and as this train will pass right through the heart of town shortly before parade time it will be seen by thousands of people and the advertising value to Salem will be considerable, indeed, and particularly so if the train is well filled thus showing the Portlanders and Easterners that Salem is a live town and attends in goodly numbers the annual festival of the metropolis of the state.

The Cherrian special will make the same time, or better, than that made by the limited trains, and the fare will be \$2 for the round trip.

The special returning will leave Portland at about 11 o'clock and arrive in Salem at 12:45. The return coupons on the tickets, however, will be good on any train leaving Portland on or before June 21st.

The train will be personally conducted by W. P. Powers, traveling freight and passenger agent of the Oregon Electric railway company, and the well known, genial "Little" Charley Maxwell of the Oregon Electric depot, in an appropriate uniform will be the mascot for the trip and will do much to make the trip a pleasant one for the patrons of the train.

The parade starts at 2 o'clock from the vicinity of 14th and Yamhill streets, and will follow the following route:

14th to Harrison, Morrison to Broadway to Alder to Pine, Pine to 3rd, 3rd to Alder, Alder to 6th, 6th to Main and disband.

The distance the Cherrians will have to march in the parade will probably be about thirty two blocks, as they will march at about 14th and Main streets. The blocks in Portland are short, however, being only 200 feet in length, and the Cherrians are congratulating themselves that this route is much shorter than have been the routes in former years.

Water Company Builds Retaining Walls to Ditch

Through the efforts of Joe Bernardi, owner of several houses on South Winter street, south of the mill race, the Salem Water company has placed concrete retaining walls on the sides of the race from the bridge on Winter street to the bridge used by the wood yard company a short distance west.

The race has been covered by Mr. Bernardi so that it will be safe for children to play about it. Heretofore he has been unable to rent his houses in proximity to the race because of the danger of children drowning.

The water company holds no franchise from the city to operate the race but received its authority from the territorial government before Oregon was a state. When the territory became a state the franchise of the territory was ratified. The franchise from the territorial government allowed the company a ditch 12 feet across at the top and eight feet across at the bottom. In placing in the retaining walls the other day the company encroached on the street and the property adjoining by taking up 15 feet of width, or three feet too much across the top.

The enlargement of the race has been made gradually from the original 12 feet allowance by washing away.

On Church street, the water company has built a large siphon for the purpose of conducting the water from the race under the street. As it was the elevation of the race was higher than the proposed grade for the new pavement that is to be put in there. Consequently the water had to be carried over or under. The best plan was to carry it under, and the siphon was built.

Evangelist Hayward To Deliver Series of Special Lectures

Elder Herbert G. Thurston, pastor of the Salem Seventh Day Adventist church, has just returned from the camp meeting which was held by that denomination in Portland from May 29 to June 10. He announces that the services of Evangelist Phil C. Hayward have been secured for a brief special lecture series to be held in Salem beginning Sunday night, June 24.

Mr. Hayward has an established reputation as a soul winner and an exponent of the prophecies of the Bible, and may be expected to have some very interesting things to say concerning the great war and the many stirring events of today in the light of the scriptures. He brings a strong force of personal workers with him, and is assisted by Professor G. E. Johnson, of Portland, who conducts the music and has charge of the personal work.

Mr. Thurston is now negotiating for a central location for the big canvas pavilion which will be erected for the brief campaign here, announcement of which will be made within a few days.
