BIG AMERICAN LINER
SINKS GERMAN 'SUB'

Attacked by Two, and Struck by Torpedo, She Manages To Get One

An Atlantic Port, June 13.—An American liner arriving here today reported that she sank a German submarine by ramming it while en route to European waters.

According to stories told by the ship's officers the vessel was attacked apparently by two submarines, which fired two torpedoes at her. One actually struck the American liner but it was a glancing blow and the war head did not explode. The liner had started steering a zig zag course as soon as the wake of a torpedo was seen. The naval guns aboard were manned and shots fired at where it was thought the submarines might be.

Finally the lookout on the stern reported a German submarine immediately ast of the vessel. The ship was quickly reversed and crashed into the under-water craft. The U-boat was plainly seen to have been sunk, it was asserted. The American liner's port propeller was damaged by the collision.

The incident occurred at a point about 200 miles off the Irish coast, late in the afternoon and when there was a smooth sea running.

Meeting at Mt. Angel
 Mt. Angel responded to the Red Cross call with 63 paid members at the meeting held last night in the city hall and the enthusiasm was such that the Mt. Angel folks expect within a few days to come forward with at least a membership of 150, just as a fair beginning.

Frank Davey made an appeal to the patriotism of all, showing that within a few months there would be an urgent need for the things that the members of the Red Cross made by members of the Red Cross.

Mrs. Etta Squier Seely told of the work being done at headquarters and also of the fact that those who handle Red Cross work are supposed to do many considerable acts on all occasions.

Mrs. E. E. Fisher spoke of the necessity of supplying surgical materials for soldiers and also of the fact that the Red Cross would have much work in caring for the families of soldiers at the front.

SECOND HAND STORE
RAIDED BY POLICE

An Imposing Array of Empty Bottles Redolent of What Was, Captured

C. W. Scott, proprietor of the second hand store at 373 Court street, was arrested yesterday evening about five-thirty o'clock on a complaint sworn out by District Attorney Gehlbach charging him with maintaining a nuisance.

On a search warrant signed by Judge Webster the police raided the store and gathered up several boxes of bottles that had contained Hostetter's bitters, Jamaica ginger, whiskey and beer. The collection was taken to the police station where it made quite an array of evidence that some intoxicating liquor had been sold.

Scott will have a hearing some time early next week. It is alleged that he has been keeping a place where men would gather from morning until night to drink liquor. It is declared there was a room kept by him for the purpose of sleeping off the effects of too deep indulgence. It was at this place that John Kiltney, who was arrested some time ago for being drunk, was found.

Confessions in the form of affidavits had been made concerning what had been going on at the second hand store. O. P. St. Clair swore that one time he went in there and took a drink and became unconscious. He says that when he went in he had about five dollars on his person but when he woke up in this room he had nothing. Other affidavits telling of how the men gathered and chipped in to buy the drinks were sworn to.

It is believed by the police that the possibility of a raid was known to Scott and that he made away with a lot of incriminating evidence.

ALLIES OCCUPATION OF GREECE TEMPORARY

So Soon As Real Constitutional Government Is Restored Will Take Hands Off

London, June 13.—The allies military occupation of Greece is all but temporary, until a real constitutional government can be restored there and all elements harmonized. Emphasis was laid on this fact here today with the suggestion Greece could be expected to play her proper part in the war.

So far as indicated here, the further steps at restoration of popular government in Greece will include exile of all of the former king's military staff—the superior royalists who joined with Constantine in thwarting the will of the Greek people. It was remarked today that unless these steps were taken it would simply be because of "a tyrant removed, but not tyranny."

Officials and the public alike regarded the allies' course toward Constantine as a further step in meeting the desires of the United States and Russia for a further indication of democratization of the world.

Military experts also hailed the action with relief, because with Constantine and his Germanophile schemes forever banned, a dangerous situation to the allies' armies in Macedonia and Salonika has been remedied.

The general impression here was that the allies' action had been taken with consultation with Italy, which, however, had previously approved such a course. Italy's recent moves in proclaiming independence of Albania and in assuming control of Epirus were probably taken to assure her interests.

The Greek legation in London—which has a personnel exclusively of Venizelist supporters, was jubilant today, expecting the restoration of Venizelos to his former power.
