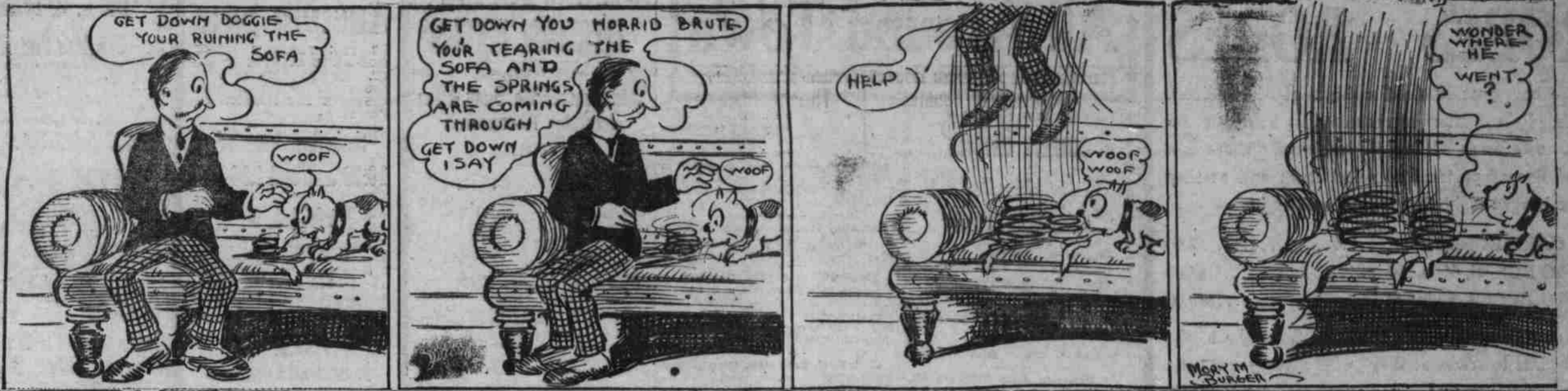

Dallas Had Costly Blaze Saturday Night (Capital Journal Special Service) Dallas, July 5.—Fire of a mysterious origin which started in the Ladies Fogery owned by Mrs. Chas. PLANT AT TURNER IS GROWING STEADILY Turner, Or., July 5.—Turner has a good flax mill doing full service as a plant. Flax is being shipped here from all parts of the state, and as the shipments increase the plant will expand to meet the trade. Three carloads of flax were received here last week from Gaston. The flax straw, about 2 1/2 tons to the acre, averages about two feet in length and the fiber was of good quality. Mr. Miller, superintendent of the Oakland, Cal., linen mills, while here a few days ago, left a contract with Mr. Hansett, manager of the plant, who sold him all the long line flax at \$500 a ton and all the tows at \$180 a ton. Mr. Hansett also sold the Gaston flax, about 15 tons, to the same purchaser at the same price. A carload has been shipped to Oakland.
