Pershing Prepares for Coming of Troops

Paris, July 13.—Some idea of the tremendous supplies which will be needed to keep Pershing's Sammys in good health and good fighting strength was indicated by announcement of the American headquarters today of contracts let.

It was stated that the largest dock firm in the United States had contracted to build dockage space for a million men, and 50,000 tons of supplies daily. All machinery and all electric for this great wharf plan will be transported from the United States.

In addition, General Pershing's experts have already ordered 125 miles of 4-inch pipe, 270,000 shovels, 40,000 each month until this number is reached—360,000 picks, 60 steam rollers and 3,000,000 board feet of lumber monthly from French forests.

GET NO COMPENSATION FOR DESTROYING DOGS

Constables Get Official Advice—Must Bury Game If They Kill It

Constable Varney, in an attempt to get some light on the dog licensing law problem, that has upset the constables of several districts around Salem, the other day asked the opinion of District Attorney Gehlhar on the matter, and today received a reply. The constable asked several questions as follows:

1. Does the law provide a method of enforcing the payment of said license other than the seizure and destruction of the dog?
2. Does the penalty provided apply to and is it enforceable against owners of dogs who refuse to pay the license, whether the dog is destroyed or not?
3. Is it the constable's duty to the penalty prescribed where he fails to collect the license and neglects to destroy the dog?
4. If the constable destroys the dog, which means the killing of it, is he obliged to bury the carcass at his own personal expense, or is he allowed a compensation for his time and labor by the county, and if not, why not, and where does he get his pay?

These are the main points in the trouble that has arisen over the enforcement of this law. In reply District Attorney Gehlhar says:

"I will state that your first two questions will have to be answered in the negative, and the third in the affirmative.

"Your fourth question is in regard to the right of compensation for burying the dog after he is killed by a constable. The law provides that the constable, if he is found in section 3, which provides that the constable may retain 10 per cent of all moneys collected by him, pursuant to such law. The act does not provide for the payment of any other expenses out of the fund, except the expenses of the county clerk for procuring the receipt blanks and tags. You will note that no compensation is provided by the act for destroying the dog, and no compensation provided for capturing him, and carrying the matter still farther, no compensation is provided in case it is necessary to give the dog a long distance chase in an effort to take him in."

The district attorney then goes on and quotes several legal opinions in which it is stated that "The rule is well settled that the right of a public officer to compensation results from the constitution or a statute, and, unless the fees or salary is attached to his office, he is entitled to none."

This makes it interesting for the constable as he gets only ten per cent of the tax collected which amounts to only about 15 cents for each dog.

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RUSSIAN SOLDIERS WILL STAY TO END

Six Thousand by Unanimous Vote Refuse To Do Anything But Fight

Petrograd, July 13.—German is desperately pouring a new flood of propaganda into Russia in a superlative effort to dampen the popular war ardor. The directing point seems to be Stockholm.

Some of the evidences of this tide of argument as gathered today were German arguments against further Russian advances on the ground that the German minority socialists had agreed to every point of the Russian peace aims, even including Alsace-Lorraine. Agitators whose previous activities have given indication of their connection with the German propaganda system are spreading these arguments.

Another rumor, apparently traceable to the same source, was that Germany was preparing for peace.

Petrograd continues jubilant at the fresh successes achieved in the great offensive. Troops in other sections of the front, who have not yet had their orders to go forward, are beginning to exhibit impatience to get at the enemy.

The ninety seventh regiment, for instance, has unanimously adopted a resolution to which six thousand votes were subscribed, refusing to cultivate the fields, and concluding:

"We will die in the trenches from disease waiting for pacifists and radical dreamers in Petrograd to have decided whether we advance. We want to advance immediately. Let the rifle be used on those trying to hold us back. The life of the republic is at stake. The only way to save it is to advance."

Minister of Posts and Telegraphs Tsereteli issued a formal letter to all telegraph employees today warning them to "speed up."

"The efficiency of the Russian telegraph system has fallen down 50 per cent," he said. "This is not due entirely to old apparatus. Employees must remember they have duties as well as rights. They owe it to Russia to do all possible, not as little work as possible."

TAKING PRECAUTIONS AGAINST 'WON'T WORKS'

Governor and Adjutant General Will Organize Special Military Force

For the purpose of providing guards for home and state protection from local disturbances and invasion from I. W. W. agitators, Governor Withycombe and Adjutant General Will, following a conference yesterday evening at the state house, have decided to organize a battalion of experienced military men. This decision was reached as a result of the report of State Insurance Commissioner Wells, who is also chief fire marshal, who returned yesterday from his trip to Eastern Oregon, where preparations were made to meet any attempt of I. W. W. agitators to do damage to the fields of ripening grain.

The men who are to form this battalion will be taken from those who served in the Spanish-American war and in the Mexican border trouble of last year. They will be armed, equipped and trained, so they will be able to meet any emergency that may arise.

In addition to this battalion, Governor Withycombe expects to request the sheriffs of the various counties to appoint special deputies who will form a second battalion which will be particularly for state defense. It is planned to have these two battalions work together whenever necessary. They are to be kept under arms and in service during the period of the war.

It is expected that the battalions will be recruited to full strength in a very short time and that the men can get down to drilling quickly. It is estimated that already fully one hundred men have enlisted.
