ATHLETICS PERK UP SHOW SIGNS OF LIFE

Have Suddenly Come to Life
and Are Doing Spectacular Stunts

New York, July 13.—Though deep down in the second division, Connie Mack's Athletics are beginning to show some stunts that promise to bear out the Philadelphia leader's threat of a couple of years ago to produce a baseball club in 1917.
A look back over the performances of the Athletics today gives evidence of some startling happenings in the Ben Johnson second division. Since June 27, the Athletics, laughed at and derided, have won ten games and lost six. Tearing into the favored White Sox in a series beginning July 8, the Mackmen took three out of four games. Since leaving Chicago they have taken two games from the Browns, the top of this, Elmer Myers hasn't faced the St. Louis crowd yet and he is just rounding into effective form.
Just a year ago when July 15 arrives, the Athletics were a hopeless last. They

had won 19 games and had dropped 7. This year the Athletics have already accumulated 29 victories, 10 more than a year ago—and lost 17—twenty less than a year ago. Likely their percentage lacks only a few points of being 200 better than a year ago.
Connie Mack's team hasn't yet entered the fight for a pennant, but things are picking up in Philadelphia.

Bagby Developing
Cleveland, Ohio, July 13.—Jim Bagby is out today on the trail of Walter Johnson's big league record of 56 consecutive scoreless innings.
The Indians' pitcher has 35 consecutive scoreless innings to his credit and the last nine of them included several against Walter himself, whom Bagby helped knock from the mound yesterday with two terrific dubbles.
Clevelanders who suddenly have pennant hopes, see Bagby going better than any other pitcher in the American league. He holds the season's record of

seven shutouts.
No Harvard Football
Boston, Mass., July 13.—There will be no football at Harvard this fall. Cancellation of dates has been announced. The action, due to the war, includes all freshmen games.
Of the football squad of fifty, all but two have enlisted and thirty nine of the forty one men in the freshman squad are ready to take the field against the Germans instead of Yale.

Corn Down Three Cents Wheat Prices Unchanged
Chicago, July 13.—Favorable weather conditions, combined with increased offerings and few buyers, sent the corn market down today from 1/4 to 3 cents from yesterday's close.
September corn opened 7-8 higher at \$1.00 1/2 and later dropped 1-3-4. December opened 1/2 down at \$1.15 3/4, subsequently selling off 3 cents.
The wheat market was inactive during the early trading, no quotations going up until just before noon. July was unchanged at \$2.04. September opened 2 1/2 higher at \$1.95 and held that figure until 5:30, but also sold 7-8 off.
Provisions were generally lower on a strong and higher hog market.
