Coal Strikes Due To Germans and I. W. W.

Says Illinois Official

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 13.—That I. W. W. agitators and German influences are responsible for the spreading strike of Illinois coal miners was the charge made by a high state official today.

The official declared these influences have been at work for months among the miners attempting to sow the seeds of discord. The fact that prices for coal have been soaring with no additional pay for the miners gave the necessary impetus to the movement started by the agitators and resulted in the strike of the drivers, which forced out the miners.

President Frank Farrington, of the Illinois miners absolutely refused today to disclose either the number of men out or the number of mines affected. According to reliable information, however, approximately twenty mines of the state, employing 12,000 miners, are idle.

Among mines which were forced to close down today because of the strike of the drivers are two at Pana. The miners officials have ordered the drivers back to work on the grounds that the strike is a violation of their agreement with the operators. The agitators, however, have done their work well, the officials say, and the men refuse to return.

While there is penalty attached to violation of the agreement, there is absolutely no way to enforce it. Attempts to do so would result in a general strike, state officials declared today.

Too Much Charity Says Berry Grower

While so much has been done for charity in Salem and vicinity, now comes the complaint there has been too much charity as it was difficult to find pickers for the berry crop. A prominent grower said he knew of several families who had been the object of charity during the winter yet when there was a great demand for loganberry pickers, they nor their children could be induced to work. Many growers lost by the scarcity of pickers and Aspinwall Bros. at no time had more than half the necessary force.

The same authority said that of 26 women and children picking on his tract, the average paid was \$1.25 a day and many children not over the age of ten years made \$1 a day. He felt that many families would not go into the berry fields simply because they felt assured that in case of need during the winter, the charitable people of this community would properly care for them.

GOVERNOR GIVES EAR TO PORTLAND DEALERS

Refuses To Declare Closed Season For Game, In Order To Prevent Fires

Because he deemed it time enough to close the hunting season after forest fires were started, Governor Withycombe this morning refused to postpone or close the hunting season, which opens on August 15 and extends until October 15, at the request of State Forester Elliott, who said the forest fire danger was the greatest since 1902. He also said it was too late to close it now because so many hunters were already in the field, and a closing proclamation would not reach them.

At the meeting of the State Forestry Board in Portland Friday, the matter of closing the season came up on account of the extreme dryness of the timber, and the danger from hunters in setting fire to it and destroying large quantities now that it is especially valuable. President McFarland, of the Oregon Sportsmen's league, and its secretary, S. C. Bartrum, of Roseburg, were both in favor of postponing the season until the first rains came, or if none came to close it entirely.

Sportsmen Asked It. Present at the meeting were Mr. Honeyman of the Honeyman Hardware company, dealers in sporting goods; a representative of the sporting goods department of the Meier and Frank department store; and a representative of another sporting goods house. These men opposed the closing of the season on account of the goods they had to sell to the hunters.

Last week Forester Elliott took the matter up with the governor to find out if the season could be closed by the state fish and game commission, but Commissioner Shoemaker did not think they could except when there was danger of game extinction. However, the forest-fire law says that the governor on "showing of the state forester that by reason of extreme drought the use of firearms or fire by hunters is liable to cause forest fires, he may, by proclamation, suspend the open season and make it a closed season for the shooting of wild birds and animals of any kind for such time as he may designate, and during the time so designated all provisions of law relating to closed seasons for game shall be in force."

The danger in forest fires is great. At that time the governor promised to look into the matter and see what could be done, and then tell the forester what he would do. But the governor did not say a word to the forester, who says he rested easy on the assumption that the governor would act before the open season began. This morning he asked the governor about the matter and the governor said it was too late.

Forester Elliott states the following reasons why the season should be closed at least until the first rain comes:

That the fire season is the worst at this time since 1902; that the logging camps now are seriously handicapped by a serious labor shortage, and that a number of camps have closed down to fight the fires now raging; and that every fire patrol association in the state is taxed to the limit and cannot get help.

Members of the Illinois-Wisconsin Retail Coal Dealers association met with Justice Carter this afternoon to outline a program of inquiry into retail prices.

Chicago, Aug. 13.—Six of the 15 state councils of defense invited to send representatives to the "coal conference" here August 16, have accepted, it was announced this afternoon. There were those of Indiana, Missouri, North Dakota, Nebraska, Ohio and Wisconsin.

Justice Carter, "fuel dictator," will meet with representatives of the railroads tomorrow to arrange an inquiry into transportation of coal.

It will probably be two weeks before Carter will be able to give his decision in Illinois coal prices.

This announcement was made today following a preliminary conference between Justice Carter, operators and members of the state council of defense at which the operators reiterated their agreement to accept Carter's verdict as final.

The operators agreed that all meetings should be public.

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Reports of the air fights, which became public today, with the admiralty announcement of German losses, reveal 21 some of the most daring flying done by the home defense forces in months.

Numerous naval machines engaged the Germans over the sea without results. The pilot who destroyed the Gotha first pursued an enemy aeroplane 12,000 feet up off the fore lands of Kentish machine. He kept hot after the enemy machine, firing as he flew but lost it off Zebruggen. Heading back toward England from across the channel, the British aviator then made for South End again. Climbing high he observed eight Gothas with four British planes pursuing them. The Gothas were 2000 feet above the British and the lone flyer climbed steadily until he was at a height of 18,000 feet. There he attacked the eight Germans alone, chasing them for thirty miles.

While in pursuit of this flock of Gothas, the British pilot observed a single hostile machine 4000 feet below. He immediately dived for it.

There was a sharp fight. The German was driven down to the water. The enemy machine overturned as it struck and the British aviator could see one occupant clinging to its tail. He threw the German's lifebelt as he swept over him, close to the water and then signalled British destroyers the disabled enemy's position.

BOARDS TO TAKE TESTIMONY

San Francisco, Aug. 13.—The district draft board for San Francisco and Alameda counties which will pass on appeals and on occupational exemptions began its work today. In the meantime the San Francisco local boards continued examinations and several boards announced they had decided to take oral testimony on exemption claims, permitting claimants to offer witnesses to support their requests for relief from service.

WHOLE FAMILY LOST

Denver, Colo., Aug. 13.—Mrs. Arthur Duckworth, who with her husband and six children, was lost in the mining of the steamer City of Athens, was formerly Miss Lydia Scoville, prominent religious worker here.

The family left Denver July 12, after spending a year's tour through here. The six children who perished were Ethel age 12, Reola 10, Edith, Martha, Scoville 2, and a baby, six months old.

ALLEGED MURDERER CAUGHT.

Grants Pass, Or. Aug. 13.—After a three day chase through the Cascade mountains, Ralph Turpin, alleged murderer of William McCallister, was caught today and is now in jail at Klamath Falls. Turpin stole a bicycle Friday and made part of the distance over mountain trails to Klamath Falls on it.

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FOREST FIRE BURNING BEYOND FALLS CITY

200 Men Fighting Blaze Which Has Already Done Damage of \$100,000

Forest fires are reported to be doing great damage in the mountains beyond Falls City, in the neighborhood of the Spaulding Black Rock camp.

According to reports of those coming from the fire this morning, the greatest damage has been at the camp of the Willamette Valley Lumber company, with headquarters at Dallas. The fire seems to have started near their camp Sunday burning the entire camp including three railroad trestles, six donkey engines, a road scraper and other camp equipment. Their loss is estimated at \$100,000. Already more than 200 men are fighting the fire.
