announcing "nothing of special interest
to report."

Sharp, brief engagements, however,
have marked the past 48 hours, as the
Germans have endeavored to regain
some of the ground taken by the Brit-
ish at the end of last week. British
artillery has been extremely well served,
however, and attacks have been broken
up with heavy losses.

Brisk fighting is still in progress on
the Aiane front where the Germans
made strong efforts to re-take positions
that would secure their line in event
a retreat in Flanders should become
necessary. The French, after repulsing
most of these attacks have regained
ground which was lost north of St.
Quentin.

Sank Too Airships.

London, Aug. 13.—Two of the German
airships, which raided the coast resort
of South End, and other towns, Sun-
day, were brought down by British fly-
ers, the admiralty announced today.
The machines were brought down off
the coast of Flanders. One of them was
a "Gotha", the new type of German
plane, while the other was a seaplane.
The admiralty statement of yester-
day announced twenty machines as tak-
ing part in the raid which resulted in
the death of 23 persons and the injury
of fifty.

front in anticipation of a strong Ital-
ian attack, reports here stated today.
Italian aeroplanes are extremely active
on the Carso and other fronts.
