## Celebrated Poem Which Caused Diplomatic Trouble

Hank, Oregon, Aug. 9.—(To the Editor of the Journal.)—I am sending you the original version of "Hoch der Kaiser." It was written by a Scotchman, A. McGregor Rose, then on the staff of the Montreal Herald, and using the nom de plume A. M. R. Gordon. He called it "Kaiser & Co." It was written during the Boer War, when Oom Paul went on a mission to solicit the aid of Kaiser Wilhelm, which, doubtless, at the dictates of discretion alone, was not forthcoming.

While possibly not up to the mark in finish and form, it is one of the most famous lampoons in existence, a position it well merits for its keen wit and incisive satire on the kaiserly character, which has after these long years ripened into such deadly activity as to throw the whole world into despair. Thackeray or Twain never did anything better, and to find its kindred we must go to Swift, Moliere or Aristophanes.

Very strangely, it has not become current in this country during this, the great kaiser war, and probably not in the English press.

It will be remembered that the kaiser in the early years of his reign developed that egotism which led him to regard himself as the direct legate of the Divine Mite bestowed upon his illustrious grandfather. The European press treated him then with good natured raillery, the worst notation made being that he showed stigmata of insanity. It was his egotism which retarded and broke the heart of old Prince Bismarck, a man far too able to have permitted his country to plunge into so fatal an impasse as it is now floundering in. And Wilhelm never rested until Caprixi also passed, and he was surrounded with mediocre men, too weak and unwise to oppose his egotistic ambitions. The lampoonist shows his historical insight by noting those incidents.

The lampoon struck its target in this country and caused a serious diplomatic flurry at Washington, when Captain Coghlan of the United States Navy recited it at a banquet, and on the complaint of the German government was reprimanded.

The brusque and unhesitating action of Admiral Dewey with reference to German ships intruding at Manila bay was not forgotten, and the kaiser's dignity was deeply ruffled.

Perhaps this untoward start accounts for the failure of the poem to circulate even now.

The text of the poem in full follows: Der Kaiser of His Fatherland Und Gott on high all things command— Ve two—ah! Don't you understand? Myself—and Gott!

He reigns in heaven and always shall, Und mein own emire don't vas schmall; Ein noble pair, I think you call Meinself—and Gott!

Vile some men sing der power divine, Mein soldiers sing "Die Waecht an Rein!" Und drink der health in Rheinish wine Of Me—and Gott.

Dere's France, she swaggers all around, She's ausgespielt (got's no aground); To much, ve think, she don't amount— Meinself—and Gott!

She vill not dare to fight again, Ve let her shouldt, I'll show her blain Dot Elsass (and in French) Lorraine— Are mein—by Gott!

Von Bismarck vas a man of might Und doubt he vas glean out of sight; But Ach! he vas nicht goot to fight Mitt Me—and Gott!

Ve knock him like ei man of sehdraw; Ve let him know whose vill vas law, Und dat ve don't veid schtand his paw Meinself—and Gott!

Ve send him outt in big disgrace; Ve gif him insult in der face; Und put Caprixi in his place— Meinself—and Gott!

Und ven Caprixi get svelled hed, Ve very promptly on him set, Und toldt him to get up and get— Meinself—and Gott!

Dere's grandma dinks she's nicht small beer, Midt Boers und such she interfere; She's learn none owns dis hemisphere— But me—and Gott!

(Note: "Grandma" was Queen Victoria of England.) She dinks, good frau, some ships she's got Und soldiers mit der searlet coat; Ach! Ve could knock dem! Pout! Like dot— Meinself—and Gott!

In dimes of heace hebare for vairs; I bear the shepar and helm of Mars, Und care not for den thousand szars— Meinself—and Gott!

In fact, I humor efty whin, Vith aspect dark und visage grim; Gott pulls mit me, I mit him— Meinself—and Gott!

## Silverton Loganberry Crop Is Gathered

The 1917 loganberry crop has all passed from the field to the juice factory and the old vines are being cut away and the vines trained for next year's harvest.

The largest grower of the loganberry in this vicinity is Dr. C. W. Keene who has given the fruit a trial on an extensive scale. He estimates that the crop this year produced about 60 per cent of what it should have been in a normal year. Practically all of the logan berries grown in this part of the valley are under contract for a term of years and the risk and fall of the market for the product does not effect the grower.

Dr. Keene is optimistic about loganberries and although he has put a goodly sum into the enterprise without any visible return in profits yet he feels that the national advertising of loganberry products will place the industry among the foremost of the state in time to come.—Tribune.
