Farmers who have had hard luck in shipping dressed meats to the commission houses at Portland are cautioned hereafter to take more care in preparing them for shipment. J. D. Mickel, dairy and food commissioner sends out this warning, stating that during the past 16 months the city health department of Portland had condemned 18,426 pounds of meat that was killed and dressed by farmers.
