EXPERT OUTLINES RUSSIAN SITUATION

Points Out That Korniloff by His Rebellion Has Done Good Work for Country

(By J. W. T. Mason)

(Written for the United Press)

New York, Sept. 13.—Conservation but not reaction is winning in Russia. It is probable that the constitutional democrats will be given new power when Kerensky reconstructs his cabinet.

Professor Milkoff, the most powerful leader of the constitutional democrats may return to his post as foreign minister which he held in the first revolutionary cabinet or be given some other portfolio.

It is apparent, however, that the Korniloff rebellion has awakened Kerensky's party to the danger that Russia might fly apart if all were allowed to do as they please.

Foreign Minister Tereshenko's statement to the United Press today bears out this interpretation. Tereshenko's declaration that "we have discovered the iron hand is the only way," is the most important pronouncement of the Kerensky government has made since Kerensky became premier.
