NEED OF TOBACCO IS ACCEPTED BY ALL MILITARY AUTHORITIES

Explanation of The Capital Journal's Arrangement with American Tobacco Co.

If you could buy as much tobacco for your 25 cents as The Capital Journal Tobacco Fund can, then there might not be so much incentive for your contributing to this fund, although the duty to send smokes to the

garett, twenty cigarettes to the pack.

The articles are all of standard, commercial size, and you could not buy them for less than 50 cents at any retail tobacco store in the country.

Thus, by contributing to this fund you can save 25 cents, which you or the soldier would have to pay if the cigarettes and tobacco were purchased by either of you.

American Soldiers and Officers Pay

Washington, Sept. 13.—All pay in the United States army is raised 20 per cent automatically, when the man goes into foreign service. Following is the domestic pay received by regular army, national guard and reserve officers and men now in service and to be received by the personnel of the conscript armies being raised:

Engineer, ordnance, signal corps, quartermaster's corps and medical department sergeants, stable sergeants of the engineers, mess sergeants of the engineers, all color sergeants, electrician sergeants of the second class, band sergeants, first class musicians of the infantry, cavalry, artillery and engineers, and second class musicians of the military academy, \$51.20 a month.

Battalion sergeant majors of the field artillery and infantry, squadron sergeant majors, sergeant majors of the junior grade, master gunners, sergeant buglers, assistant band leaders, \$56 a month.

Regimental sergeant majors, regimental supply sergeants, sergeant majors of the senior grade, quartermaster's corps, quartermaster's corps, first sergeant, battalion sergeant majors of the engineers, battalion supply sergeants of the engineers, electrician sergeants of the first class, first class sergeants of the quartermaster's corps, engineers and signal corps, assistant engineers and first class musicians of the military academy, \$60 a month.

First class sergeants of the medical department, field musician sergeants of the military academy, \$66. Hospital sergeants, master engineers of the junior grade and engineers, \$84.

Quartermaster sergeants of the senior grade of the quartermaster's corps, band leaders, master signal electricians, master electricians, master engineers of the senior grade, master hospital sergeants, band sergeants and assistant band leaders of the military academy, \$96 a month.

This pay is for first enlistments. It increases with each enlistment in the regular army. Because of special qualifications and service, certain men draw pay, or bonuses, beyond the regular enlistment pay, as follows:

Mess sergeants, \$6; easement electricians, \$9; first class observers, \$9; plotters, \$9; coxswains, \$9; chief planters, chief loaders, second class observers, gun commanders and gun pointers, \$7; each; surgical assistants, expert first class gunners, \$5; and expert riflemen \$5 each; private first class nurses, sharpshooters and first class gunners, \$3 each; second class gunners, marksmen, dispensary assistants and holders of the certificate of merit, \$2 each.

PREPARING TO TAKE STEAMERS OFF RUN

Freight Received Up to 5
o'clock Saturday—Last
Boat Up That Day

The Oregon Transportation company will receive freight at the dock in Salem for Portland and way points as late as 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon of this week.

The warehouse for the delivery of freight will be held open Monday and Tuesday of next week. After that date arrangements will be made whereby uncalled for freight will be stored with the Capital City Transfer company.

The last boat to leave will be Sunday morning for Portland carrying freight and passengers. This is the boat that ordinarily would leave Monday morning.

By orders from the war department, the locks at Oregon City will be closed next Tuesday night at midnight. This will of course put an end to the running of all boats for a period of six weeks or two months.

This shutting off of river transportation in the midst of the fruit and grain season will work a hardship to the farmers living near the 113 landing points between Salem and Portland.

Many of these farmers have contracted for the delivery of apples, peaches and prunes beside their grain crops and now with no means of shipping they are facing a difficult proposition.

If the river had been closed during July and August for the repairs and deepening of the locks at Oregon City, no one would have suffered, as there is a little freight moving. The hardship to the farmer results from the closing of the locks just during the two weeks or two months or two months when they are moving fruits and grain crops.

But the orders of the war department were to close the locks for repairs beginning Sept. 19 and the Oregon Transportation company had no other course to take than to take off the boats between Salem and Oregon City.

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\$500,000 BLOCK OF ROAD BONDS SOLD

Salem Bank Bids In Issue
For Eastern Security
Buyers

Portland, Or., Sept. 13.—The second block of \$500,000 of the state's \$6,000,000 issue of highway bonds was sold yesterday by the State Highway Commission at a meeting in Portland for \$830 more than the first block of the same amount brought a few weeks ago.

The Capital National bank, of Salem, bidding for E. H. Rollins & Sons and the National City Bank of New York, got the bonds sold yesterday on its bid of \$472,130. This was on a basis of 94.426 and accrued interest. The bonds, on this basis, will return the equivalent of 4 5/8 per cent interest.

First Block Sells for \$471,300.

For the first block of \$500,000 of the bonds, also sold through the Capital National bank, of Salem, \$471,300 was received by the commission.

There were four bids yesterday for the entire \$500,000 block, and one bid for \$25,000 worth of the bonds. The bids and bidders were as follows:

Capital National Bank, of Salem, for E. H. Rollins & Sons and the National City Company, of New York, \$472,130.

Lumbermen's Trust Company, of Portland, \$466,700.

Henry Teal, of Portland \$465,500.

Harris Trust & Savings Company, of Chicago and Clark, Kendall & Co., of Portland \$459,005.

Citizen's Bank of Portland, \$25,000 worth of bonds at 4 5/8 per cent.

The Commission at its meeting yesterday, which was a brief one, transacted some important business.

Highway Route Chosen.

It decided the important question of the location of the Columbia River highway in Columbia county near St. Helens by voting that it shall follow the so-called west side route. This route will carry the highway through Houlton, which is now a part of the town of St. Helens by annexation, but not through St. Helens proper.

Selection of this route settles a long mooted question. It eliminates 13 railroad crossings, besides saving two miles in distance. Commissioners Benson and Adams voted for the west side route and Commissioner Thompson did not vote.

Road to Reach Arlington.

The Commission also decided that the Columbia River Highway this side of Arlington, in Gilliam county, shall follow the Columbia river from the John Day river, which divides Sherman and Gilliam counties. This brings the highway into Arlington via Quinton and Elbrook. The condition was made that the Gilliam county road districts involved shall vote a 10-mill levy to be expended on the highway.

The decision to adopt this route to a considerable extent nullifies the previous tentative decision of the Commission, pending an investigation, to route the highway in Sherman county away from the Columbia river and by way of the town of Wasco and McDonald's Ferry, and thence to Arlington.

That part of this proposed route via McDonald's Ferry is automatically eliminated by the decision to follow the Columbia river in Gilliam county.

East Side Road First.

The east side trunk road of the Pacific Highway is to be completed before the west side road, the Commission decided, because, in view of the desire of the people of the west side for a circuitous route from McMinnville to Bellevue to Ballston, and thence to Dallas, the east side road will be much more direct. The Commission took the view that the interests of the state as a whole require completion of the direct route before any meandering route shall be constructed.

Bridges To Be Rushed.

This decision is understood to be satisfactory to officials of Polk and Yamhill counties, with whom Commissioner

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COAL OPERATORS ARE DISOBEYING THE LAW

Are Warned by Federal Commissioner "the Law Is Full of Teeth"

Washington, Sept. 13.—Coal operators and dealers in two or three sections are violating President Wilson's coal price orders, according to reports to the fuel administration.

Violations in Ohio are declared "most serious." Federal investigation is under way.

Home owners in hundreds of cities are unable to lay in their usual winter supply and face great hardship as a result of developments in the coal situation. The first cold spell this week brought thousands of letters to state and federal authorities—complaints by consumers and dealers that they could get no coal. The violations of the president's order are taking several forms. One is refusal to sell at the government's scale of prices. Another is selling at higher figures after secret "gentlemen's agreements" over the telephone. A third is a claim that there is no coal available not previously contracted for.

The United Press was informed today that if these practices are not stopped immediately the full power of the Federal coal amendment to the food control law will be used. Punishment by \$5,000 fine and two years imprisonment for each separate offense is provided.

Ex-Governor Fort, New Jersey, member of the federal trade commission today warned operators of the seriousness of attempts to violate the government's coal order.

"They don't realize what they are doing," he said. "The law is full of teeth."

Adams conferred in person.

The Commission, in line with previous action in regard to work on the Pacific Highway in the Siskiyou and on the McMinnville-Sheridan road, declared that because of the near approach of the rainy season, which would stop work, an emergency exists relative to construction of bridges on the Columbia River Highway in Columbia county.

State Highway Engineer Nunn was, therefore, directed to work the bridge crews during the period of the emergency, which is until the beginning of the rainy season, on 10-hour shifts instead of eight-hour shifts, with the proviso that they are to be paid on an eight-hour day basis, with double time for the two hours' overtime.

Dairyman to Provide,
Canned Music for Cows

San Francisco, Sept. 13.—Canned music will increase the production of "canned cow" on the prize dairy ranch of W. W. Ward, near Eureka.

"Play the right sort of music when your milking her, and a cow will give ten per cent more milk," asserts Ward.

"I'm going to take the phonograph out of my yacht and install it in the dairy barn. It makes the cows contented. You've got to play the right sort of music, though. My herdsmen, graduates of Cornell and Ames college, tell me a funeral march makes cows sad, and bangy, stirring music gets 'em excited, so they don't give as much milk. They like something like 'The Blue Danube'."

Ward doesn't believe his thoroughbreds would stand for "The Star Spangled Banner" and he figures "Silent Threads Among the Gold" might poison the milk.

Chicago, Sept. 13.—Good commission house demand and covering by local shorts, together with scattered showers in the central corn belt, were the bullish factors that sent corn up 5/8 to 1 today over yesterday's closing prices.

December corn opened at \$1.18, up 3/8 and later gained 5/8. May opened 3/8 lower at \$1.14 5/8, but subsequently recovered to \$1.15 5/8.

The trade figured the wet weather would delay the threshing and movement of oats and bid that grain up to 7/8.

September oats opened 1/4 higher at 59 1/8, later selling 59 3/4. December opened unchanged later gaining 1/4. May was 1/4 off at the opening, but subsequently gained 1/2 to 61 1/8.

Provisions were generally higher, despite a lower hog market.

BAD TIME TO VISIT RUSSIA.

Stockholm, Sept. 13.—The British legation here was advised today by British Ambassador Buchanan at Petrograd, that it would be inadvisable for British subjects to visit Russia at this time. American Minister Morris has cabled the state department asking instructions on the advisability of making similar announcement as regards Americans.
