POSTOFFICE FUNDS TAKEN

Portland, Or., Oct. 5.—William F. Keady, a son of the late W. P. Keady, pioneer citizen of Oregon, was sentenced yesterday to serve 13 months in the McNeil's Island federal penitentiary by Federal Judge Bean on his plea of guilty to having embezzled \$1840.13 in small amounts from money order funds at the Waldport, Or., postoffice, where he was postmaster.

Marion F. Dolph, Keady's attorney, laid stress upon the defendant's previous good character and extenuating circumstances. Judge Bean, in passing sentence, said that the crime of which Mr. Keady was guilty was a betrayal of trust, an offense too serious to be overlooked.

HEARST INDICTMENT OVER FEDERAL EXPOSE

Publisher Who Has Backed German Interests Threatens Suit for Slander

New York, Oct. 5.—Evidence showing that Paul Bolo Pasha obtained huge sums from German Ambassador von Bernstorff in New York for his work of corrupting French newspapers will be sent to Paris by Attorney General Lewis of New York early next week, it was learned today. It will be used in the prosecution of Bolo Pasha now in jail in Paris, charged with being a German spy. When a statement from William Randolph Hearst, threatening to sue the attorney general for slander, was called to Lewis' attention today, he said:

"It is far from my purpose to attack Hearst. That is evident because I had no purpose in attacking him. As far as I know, Hearst's connection with Bolo Pasha was only social."

It developed today that at Bolo Pasha's dinner, the guests included, besides Mr. and Mrs. Hearst: Carl Van Anden, managing editor of the New York Times, and Mrs. Van Anden; Mr. and Mrs. Julian Gerard, Mrs. Owen Johnson, Miss Helen Smith, C. F. Bertell and Adolph Pavenstadt.

It was in the middle of March, 1916, Adolph Pavenstadt, former head of a bank which handled Bolo Pasha's funds in New York, was questioned by Deputy Attorney General Becker in the investigation. He said Bolo Pasha told him he wanted some influential American to aid him in working for a separate peace between France and Germany. He declared Bolo Pasha showed him a copy of a contract with the French Senator Humbert, owner of the Paris Journal, showing that he intended to purchase an interest in that newspaper.

it. The record discloses that though Senator Stone opposed the declaration of war, he has since it was adopted voted for all such measures considered by the senate in which a record vote was taken."

In his letter to the committee, Senator Stone said:

"It appears that one of the papers submitted to your committee by the vice president was a letter addressed to him by W. E. D. Stokes, New York, who accused me, with others, of being guilty of disloyal acts."

"This communication is vicious and incendiary in the highest degree and I cannot refrain from expressing my surprise that the vice president would submit such a paper to the senate for publication in the record and for the consideration of a standing committee."

"I feel that I have a right to insist, as I do insist, that a matter which thus blatantly assaults my integrity and my loyalty should not be laid aside or even postponed to a day by the committee whose duty it is to consider and dispose of the matter."

"The authors of the columns may speak ignorantly or maliciously—as to their motives I do not know, nor do I care—but when they are formally laid before the senate in the way these were, no matter whether the source of its origin is irresponsible or otherwise, and without regard to the knowledge or motive of the men who prefer the charges, I insist that a senator who knows that he is unjustly accused has a right to have the committee examine into the facts at once and report their finding to the senate."
