When Miss Byrd began the study of piano her hands were the size of a child's, fingers missing the octaves by two notes. However, she devised all sorts of calisthenics and exercises, which might add to the breadth of her palms and the length of her fingers. Miss Byrd, it is said, is not a slave to any particular school or style, although she has made a special study of Chopin."

"Already many engagements have been booked for the young pianist, by her manager, Marie Gunley. They include, Union Hill, N. J., Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Buffalo, N. Y., Chicago, Ill., and Peoria, Ill., in November."
