Polk County Circuit Court, October Term, In Session During Week

(Capital Journal Special Service.)
Salem, Or., Oct. 6.—The Polk County circuit court which is holding the October term in Salem this week is getting out the cases as rapidly as the wheels of law will admit. The session started the first of the week with the hearing of several applications for citizenship papers by foreign residents of the county, five of these applicants received their naturalization papers. The damage case of Frances J. Hatch against Weldon Black for the killing of Mr. Hatch in this city in an automobile accident on the Dallas streets last year was the next case on the docket and occupied the attention of the court for about two days. The jury after deliberating over the case for about seven hours returned a verdict in favor of the defendant. Black was tried on the same charge at the April term of court and the jury at that time found the defendant not guilty of the charge. The case of Dr. F. G. Hewitt for performing an alleged criminal operation on a young girl of this county is occupying the attention of the court at the present time. John McNary of Salem, Oscar Hayter of this city and B. P. Swope of Independence are attorneys of Dr. Hewitt.

Dallas Business Sold.

And more than that, before planting, the farmer can contract for five or ten years and know just exactly what is coming to him. It seems now the farmer finally has things coming his way as he runs no risk of a market. The product of his labor is sold before he plants.

THE PIONEER BOARD ELECTS OFFICERS

Had Charge of State Fair Up to Ten Years Ago—Many Members Gone

The Pioneer Board, known as the Oregon State Agricultural society, which had charge of the state fair from its organization until about ten years ago, at a meeting held a few days ago elected the following officers: President, John G. Wright. Vice president, Judge P. H. D'Arcy. Secretary, A. F. Miller. Treasurer, George O. Savage. This Pioneer Board, organized to have charge of the agricultural displays of the state fair, first met in 1861 and continued in active service until 1907. At present the board is keeping up its organization of members who were active in the work, just as an honorary board, with no active duties.

At the meeting a few days ago, a motion was unanimously carried to the effect that the board hold its next annual banquet on the second day of the state fair, 1918, at the state fair grounds. Out of an original membership of 100, there are but 30 members now living.

A committee on resolutions, consisting of Judge P. H. D'Arcy, W. J. Irwin and J. T. Hunt drafted the following which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we tender to their families and friends our sincere condolence and express our sorrow at the absence of these worthy gentlemen and friends from this annual meeting.

Resolved, That we shall ever treasure their advice and good counsel which has from time to time been given to us.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the records of our proceedings, and that a copy be sent to each of the families of our deceased members, as a token of the high esteem in which their memory is held by our membership.
