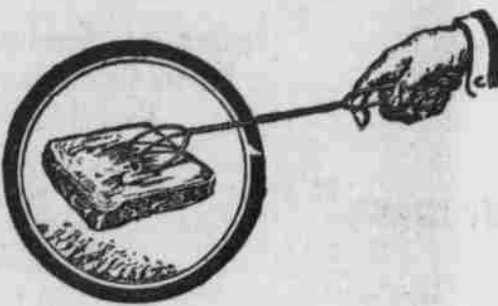

Fatal Auto Accidents

Portland, Or., Oct. 8.—Two were killed and eight injured in automobile accidents near Portland within the last 24 hours.

Adolph Schneider, prominent Portland cheese manufacturer, was killed and seven members of his party injured when their machine, driven by Miss Louise Schneider, was hit by a Southern Pacific locomotive near Hillsboro. The girl was racing with the train and tried to cross the tracks ahead of it.

Albert E. Hornschuch, also injured, died today.

Mrs. E. W. Stubbs was killed near Salem last night and her husband injured when their machine went off the road.

Portland Very Wet

Portland, Or., Oct. 8.—Traffic in liquor in bone dry Portland has grown to such an extent, Municipal Judge Rossmann announced today, that all persons convicted of drunkenness or violation of the prohibition statutes would be given jail sentences. The number of arrests is rapidly increasing.

Portland Labor Troubles

Portland, Or., Oct. 8.—Conferences between officials of the Portland Railway, Light and Power company and a committee from the carmen's union were resumed today in an effort to adjust difficulties which threaten to cause a strike. The union's demand for an eight hour day is now the principal issue.

MANY LATIN NATIONS NOW ALIGNED WITH FOES OF GERMANY

Peru Is Latest South American Country to Sever Diplomatic Ties

Buenos Aires, Oct. 8.—Two more Latin-American nations were today aligned against autocracy and frightfulness on the seas. The Peruvian government, according to Lima dispatches, followed up its action in handing passports to German officials there with cables in

structions to the Peruvian minister in Berlin to demand his own safe conduct. Montevideo reported the Uruguayan government ready to take the same step. The German minister has already been handed his passports, following an overwhelming vote in both houses of congress favoring a diplomatic rupture.

The best information today indicated that Peru's and Uruguay's action would not affect Argentina. Dispatches from Chile expressed the belief that Valparaiso would likewise continue the nation's neutrality.

With Peru and Uruguay at diplomatic odds with Germany eleven Central and South American nations have joined the world combine against the central powers. Cuba declared a state of war against Germany April 7, immediately following the American action. On April 10 Panama took the same step and on the day following Brazil broke relations. Bolivia suspended diplomatic interchange on April 13; Guatemala on April 28, Honduras on May 18; Nicaragua on May 19, Germany severed relations with Haiti June 9, and Santo Domingo broke with Germany June 1.

Patriotism now meant loyalty to one's country; devotion to her welfare, and love for her people. It was a deep passionate feeling that had sent men forth from home and loved ones to face even death. It was a strange power that had inspired men to engage in bloody conflict—brother against brother and father vs. son. It had inspired nations of people to great and heroic deeds of strength and endurance never before dreamed of. It had made strong men of the weak, brave men of cowards. Yes, it meant all this and yet what was it?

More and more vague grew its real meaning until with the advent of the United States in the world's war now raging in Europe there came to me the true meaning of patriotism. Patriotism now means watching the loved ones march away to face death, alone, leaving behind the weak and helpless to face—God knows what—it means staying at home in peace and comfort with the knowledge that far away loved ones, perhaps weak with hunger or weary with days and days of ceaseless marching and scrambling over rough and unfamiliar ground and strewn battlefields are fighting, striving, preparing to meet the last charge with a brave and smiling face. Patriotism means preparing to go on through life without their loving guidance and protection or years and years of weary struggling to build again homes of comfort and of happiness. It means a continual drain from the individual store of strength and endurance. For what? Not love, loyalty and devotion toward an inanimate country, but love, loyalty and devotion to the home and loved ones; a sense of wishing to protect them thru unity and with another, blended with the wish to carry out the high ideals of equality and justice towards all humanity imbued through Christ's teachings.

Therefore every man, woman or child no matter the race, color or nationality, must have this feeling towards the union under which he makes his home; a loyalty to her government, a devotion to her welfare, a love for her people and a pride in her that will inspire him to want to make her the leading nation in all that is just and right or he has not a true and happy home. If

he cannot rightfully give this feeling toward the union under which he makes his home he must cease to draw profit from her. If he ceases to be a loyal unit of the union, a faithful worker in the kingdom he must, in justice to the union, the kingdom or his own home cease to be a parasite.

As to how far he must let this feeling carry him in times of strife as now, he must use common sense of what is right and right toward other nations, give his best first, last and always to the union under which he makes his home; be loyal to her government, devoted to her welfare, love her above all others and beyond this he cannot go. He must not, whatever he does, call himself a patriot for one nation true patriotism is for his own, for true patriotism inspires not hate but rather a righteous indignation towards an offender of the Christian laws of justice and equality under which true and happy home life thrives.

The slackening of U-boats may be in part accounted for by the British successes and their menace to the bases, though experts warn that Germany may be temporarily low on torpedoes and that she is merely replenishing for a new sea drive along the American supply lanes.

A few lines from Baker's weekly war summary, painting a hopeful color in the war situation, are:

"The defeats inflicted upon the Germans during the past fortnight and conclusive indications of allied superiority. The full success of these operations means that the Belgian coast, with its numerous submarine bases, will become untenable to the enemy. Zeebrugge, Ostend and the system of canals leading out of Bruges are threatened."

German Infantry Attacks.

London, Oct. 8.—German infantry was once again in action against new British positions in Flanders and once again unsuccessfully—Field Marshal Haig reported today.

"Between Hallebeke and Broodseinde after a heavy enemy barrage yesterday at dusk, east of Polygon wood, infantry actions developed," he said. "The enemy was driven off and a few taken prisoner."

The British commander-in-chief likewise reported a successful raid by his troops east of Monchy during the night.

Paris, Oct. 8.—German attacks against French outposts in Craonne and the Champagne were thrown back, today's official statement declared. In Belgium and the Aisne sectors, the war office reported artillery activity on both sides.

London, Oct. 8.—The violence of British artillery fire has compelled the enemy's evacuation of Ostankamila, in the Saloniki fighting sector, an official statement asserted today.

and importance, however, is the problem of transport supply.

"My observations indicate that Germany is weakening—despite the Russian collapse. She is on the defensive on all western fronts. But it is necessary to remember that she is fighting on inside lines now, behind pillbox defenses.

"The Italians are doing marvelous work," he declared. "It is the allies' duty to cooperate with Italy's aim, against the fullest extent Italy already has Austria wobbling."

The Illinois representative has been constantly traveling and studying the war for eleven weeks. He has visited every war front in Europe except that in Greece and conferred with all important military and civil officers. McCormick is convinced that America must awaken to her responsibilities and her duties at once and must concentrate every energy toward the problem of providing unheard of quantities of munitions and supplies and of solving the question of transporting them. He will hurry to Washington on his arrival in America, to lay this data before officials.
