Von Bernstorff Coin Figured in Millions

Washington, Oct. 8.—Count von Bernstorff provided many millions of dollars other than the funds he got for Bolo Pasha. It is admitted at the state department that evidence of the use of many other sums is in the department's hands. No figure as to the amount of money thus used was given, but it was admitted that the total might have reached \$50,000,000.

Some confusion on this score was occasioned by the various codes used. This would have meant a sum of \$50,000,000 for the United States congress alone. It was later ascertained definitely that \$50,000 was the correct amount.
