Court House News

A suit was commenced in the circuit court this morning by C. A. Demasters against Charles O. Dunnett and wife; P. L. Wood and wife, the Salem Trust company; Homer Gouley, and Carle Abrams. The action is brought to foreclose two mortgages given by Charles O. Dunnett and wife to plaintiff in May, 1912, the first to secure the payment of a note in the sum of \$8000, and the other in the sum of \$2000. The other parties defendant are made such to settle claims they may have against the property given as security. The sum of \$650, is asked as attorneys fees in the one case and of \$200 in the other.

Hattie J. Chance filed her complaint in an action for divorce against Henry J. Chance. She alleges they were married at Albany in 1909 and that three children were born to them. She alleges cruel and inhuman treatment, among other things that she hoed, worked and cultivated a crop of potatoes and one of peppermint which defendant sold for \$400, and that he squandered the money, she receiving only \$15 of it, though she earned it all. She asks the custody of the children.

In the suit of J. Wied and others against Julia Weddie Peters and others, plaintiff filed a reply.

A marriage license was issued yesterday permitting Johnnie F. Curtis and Deborah Sullivan to face a minister, and after that, life together.

AT THE LIBRARY

"Why we are at war" is a collection of the messages and proclamations of our president, made during the year 1917.

"The war, madame" by Paul Gerdard, portrays in a light, sketchy manner the character and viewpoint of the French soldier.

Singmaster's "Martin Luther" is a short, interesting biography of the hero of the reformation. Luther is an especially appropriate subject now at the four hundredth anniversary of his work.

The author of "Aces of diamonds" Russell R. Conwell, has given us also "What you can do with your will power."

"How to study effectively" is a little book full of good rules for high school and college students, prepared by professor Whipple. Teachers and students will find helpful suggestions in it.

In "Aircraft of today," Charles Turner traces the development of airplanes from the first mechanical balloons to the modern war aeroplanes. The last chapter lists the world records, and all aeronautical terms are defined.

The new fiction this week shows the titles: "The spinster" by Cleghorn and "Our next door neighbors" by Mantel, the author of "Amarilly of Clothesline alley." These are the new books this week, and there are others just as interesting that are already on the shelves. CROSS SALEM BRIDGE

NEXT MONDAY MORNING

County Judge Bushey this afternoon announced that the bridge across the Willamette, the temporary one, will be open for traffic Monday morning. The approach is being rapidly completed and it was expected this could be done by night, but this is found impossible, and work will be continued tomorrow until the bridge and approaches are ready for travel. Things are in such shape that further delay is improbable and those who have waited so long and so patiently through the interminable delays can at last cross the river without a wearying wait.

State House News

The Jobs Milling company of Portland has filed a complaint with the public service commission against the Southern Pacific railroad alleging that it has had orders placed with the company for a long time but can neither get cars nor any satisfactory answer as to when, if ever, cars will be furnished. It states that it has contracts for delivering feed to the dairy men for their stock in Coos county and at points along the Southern Pacific. It also alleges that unless it can ship this feed the dairy interests of those sections will be injured and that they may be compelled to kill their cows. It asks that the proposed arrangement by which cars of the O. W. R. & N. are to be turned over to the Southern Pacific be put in operation to relieve the situation.

A class of girls from the Mt. Angel academy visited the state house and other state institutions this morning.

Articles of incorporation were filed this morning as follows: Astoria Flouring Mills company, increasing its capital stock from \$1000,000 to \$200,000. Northwest Lumber & Fuel company, place of business Portland, capital stock \$3000, and object to deal in lumber and fuel.

Gottor & Company, place of business Enterprise, capital stock \$20,000, and object to deal in agricultural machinery autos, etc.

The Elkhead Quicksilver company, place of business Roseburg, capital stock \$500,000 and object to mine, mill and smelt all kinds of ores and minerals to own and operate mines and do a general mining business.

Mt. Angel Commercial Club Actively at Work

(Capital Journal Special Service.) Mt. Angel, Oct. 13.—At the Commercial club meeting Oct. 11, a telegram was read from C. G. Chapman relative to liberty loan speaking campaign, informing of the fact of meeting to be held here 7:30 p. m. Wednesday, Oct. 17th. Chairman Col. J. M. Peorngan; speakers, Judge Henry E. McGinn and William S. Hornibrook. Whereupon reception committee consisting of Dr. E. G. D. Ebner was appointed. Arrangements are also being made to give the matter due local publicity and a round-

ing meeting is anticipated.

Another enterprise which has been shaping itself in the good old unpunctuated Mt. Angel way, is the gradual development of a certain unique rock quarry located in the foothills about 15 miles from Mt. Angel. A. Warren Gould of Seattle, one of the new additions to the membership of the Commercial club, who intends making his home here this winter, opened a road to the quarry and arranging to permanently locate plant here for working up the rock. He is well pleased with the co-operation he is receiving from the people of Mt. Angel which has been given him almost unsolicited.

Date was set for an elaborate "good roads celebration" in conjunction with the Mt. Angel college, in recognition of the completion of 2 1/2 miles of paved road and streets connecting the city with the college. Saturday Nov. 17 has been chosen as the date. Invitations are being extended to the entire state highway commission and Marion county court and their co-operation, as well as the co-operation of enthusiastic delegations from Woodburn, Silverton, Scotts Mills, Monitor, Marion and McKee, is anticipated in order to make this one of the most memorable events of its kind ever attempted in these parts. The people of Mt. Angel were pioneers in building permanent roads, having been instrumental in establishing the Mt. Angel-

Scotts Mills rock road which was the first completed unit of macadam road constructed in Marion county. They also strongly favored both county and state road bonding propositions, showing that they are a progressive people ready to assist any movement that will assure good positive and permanent road results.

Sunday morning, October 7th, at 10 o'clock, at his home in Happy Hollow, about 5 miles northeast of Stayton, occurred the death of L. N. English, at the ripe old age of 85 years.

Mr. English and wife and son W. H. who lives at home, were preparing to move to their home in Stayton, when he was taken sick Monday, and nothing that medical skill or loving care could do proved of any benefit.

He was born in Iowa, in 1832, and came to Oregon, in 1845. In 1852 he was married to the wife who survives him. To this union four children were born; one son dying in 1884. Those living are Mrs. Byron Denny, Wm. H. and John M., all residing near the old home. Mr. English had resided on this farm for 46 years to the day he was taken sick.—Stayton Mail.
