Men Stood By Their Posts. Washington, Oct. 22.—Sixty-seven lives were lost in the torpedoing of the American transport Antilles, it was definitely and officially announced to-day. War department authorities an-ticipated today that a check of the list of casualties on the torpedoed American transport Antilles would be forwarded at once by General Pershing. Arrival of the survivors at a French port made it possible to tally the muster rolls in France. There should be little delay in getting these through, as orders have been given to put casualty lists ahead on the cables.

Incidentally, families of the dead will benefit by the new soldiers' insurance law. The payments will be at the rate of \$25 a month for 240 months, widows

Big Contracts Let To Portland Mills

Portland, Or., Oct. 22.—Contracts for approximately 26,000,000 feet of lumber, to be used in the construction of 20 steam auxiliary schooners for the French government, have been placed by the Foundation company, of New York, which maintains a yard on the O. W. R. & N. "boneyard" property, the mills awarded the business being the In-man-Poulsen Lumber company and the N. E. Ayer Lumber company.

It is estimated that each vessel will require 1,300,000 feet of lumber in her construction, and much of that for the first one, such as keels on and frame material, is being delivered. Lumber from Inman-Poulsen's mill will be drawn from the mill in the upper har-bor, while the Ayer interests have the North Pacific mill, just north of the Foundation company's site and the St. John's Lumber company, at St. John's.

Allies Move Forward

London, Oct. 22.—French and Brit-ish forces in co-operation early today moved on both sides of the Ypres-Stu-don railway in a wide series of local attacks, a cold Marshal Haig reported. "Our progress was satisfactory," the British commander in chief reported.

The French forces co-operated in the attack to the left of the British. For five or six days British artillery has been exceedingly active in this sector, indicating resumption of Haig's of-fensive. The assault reported today, however, was specifically identified by Haig as a series of "local attacks" in contradistinction of a general blow. It was believed here, however, that this series of attacks are the prelimi-naries to another terrific drive over this whole sector. The fact that the French participated was also consid-ered evidence that the great allied war machine is on again in forward posi-tion.

French Gain Objectives

Paris, Oct. 22.—"All objectives" were gained by French troops attack-ing on a front of a thousand yards to the left of the British line in Flanders the war office statement announced to-day.

"South of Veldok," the statement said, "we made progress and took prisoners."

Of the fighting elsewhere on the French front, the war office said: "Southeast of St. Quentin, at Mene-jean farm, Pantheon and Tahure, we carried out successful raids. Along the Aisne artillery was active."

Russians Fought Bravely

London, Oct. 22.—Bravery of the personnel of the Russian Riga gulf fleet for the time being has at least balked Germany of the chief benefit which she had hoped from her great naval offensive in that section. Offi-cials today accorded the greatest ad-miration to the feat of the Russian Riga fleet in eluding the gigantic Ger-man fleet and escaping a bottling up which had been regarded as inevit-able.

According to Petrograd dispatches, the Russian war vessels, forced back into Riga bay last week by overwhelm-ing superiority of the Germans, slipped through the carefully patrolled waters of Moon sound and were safely reported in the Gulf of Finland today.

Get Six Aeroplanes. London, Oct. 22.—Six German aero-planes were downed yesterday during British bombing raids on the Vlesseg-bam and Houttave aerodromes, an ad-miralty statement announced today.

Washington, Oct. 22.—More than 12,000 German deserters have found refuge in Switzerland, according to the Swiss paper Bund, official Rome cables today asserted.

TODAY'S WAR BULLETINS

Rome, Oct. 22.—The Vatican cannot understand why the allies have not an-swered Pope Benedict's peace plea. The mystery was deepened today by clericals reading the statement of Lord Robert Cecil that England has not announced adoption of the American reply.

Vatican leaders warmly praise the United States for its prompt reply in such "democratic, above board diplo-macy."

London, Oct. 22.—Both Premier Lloyd George and Chancellor of the Exchequer Bonar Law were to make ministerial speeches this afternoon at a meeting in Albert hall, launching a big national economy campaign.

Amsterdam, Oct. 22.—Kaiser Wilhelm has not yet accepted the resignation of Admiral von Capelle as minister of marine, according to the Berlin Volks-zeitung today.

Admiral von Capelle resigned about ten days ago following bitterness aroused in the reichstag over the charge that he revealed the news of a German naval mutiny for political purposes.

Washington, Oct. 22.—Four thousand persons were killed and 10,000 pound-ed in Stofeld, Austria's great arsenal, in a series of great explosions June 16.
