Search for Seattle Criminal. Seattle, Wash., Oct. 26.—Police are today searching for a strange type of criminal who attacked Alberta Sanborn, 15, a Lincoln high school girl, in her home here late yesterday.

Carrying a club and a revolver, he hid in a bedroom and attacked the girl as she entered. Although the girl was knocked down, she fought and screamed until the slugging ran from the house, saying: "Don't wear your little red hat again."

Mrs. Rosenberg Acquitted. Seattle, Wash., Oct. 26.—Mrs. Amy Rosenberg today stands acquitted of second degree murder for killing her husband, Fred C. Rosenberg, by a jury in Judge Everett Smith's department of the superior court, after four and a half hours deliberation.

Mrs. Rosenberg was charged with shooting her husband following a quarrel in their home here in September.

State House News

The Industrial Accident Commission is wrestling with a knotty problem. Some time ago Frank Shildo while employed by the Northwest Steel company of Portland, met with an accident by which one of his hands was cut off. He had a wife and two children, and coming under the provisions of the law was allowed by the commission temporarily \$35 a month, this to be reduced to \$25 a month. He has made all kinds of a nuisance of himself to the commission, for several months and now passes up the problem aforesaid.

It seems he has been convicted of arson in Portland, in the burning of a rented house for the purpose of collecting the insurance on his household goods. He was to have been sentenced this morning, and may have been, but no word has been received concerning this. Owing to his maimed condition and having a family it is at least probable he will be paroled, and this may simplify the problem which is "can a man doing time in the state prison be at the same time a recipient of aid from the state?"

O. A. C. Graduate Is Government Appointee Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oct. 26.—S. H. Boddingshouse, a graduate of 1912 from horticultural department of O. A. C., has been appointed investigator of apple grades and packs with the United States bureau of markets. Mr. Boddingshouse will study apple grades and standards in all fruit districts of the northwest states to find whether it is possible to establish national stand for all box packs. Mr. Boddingshouse's home is at Kllickitat, Wash., but his official headquarters are at Washington, D. C.
