## Telephone Strike Decision Will Come Tomorrow

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—The president's mediation board, headed by Secretary of Labor Wilson, will render its decision in the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company strike controversy, tomorrow afternoon, it was announced today.

While no statement was made by any members of the board, it was reported that the decision will not recognize the telephone operators' union. The commissioners will hold, however, it is reported, that the operators have a right under the constitution to form such an organization and the telephone company will be ordered not to discriminate against any member of such union.

The commission has not the power nor is it within its province to say whether or not there should be union recognition, the board will say, but it will add that the workers have the tacit permission of the commission to use their constitutional prerogatives.

A substantial wage increase for members of the electrical workers union will be provided, it is understood.

President F. J. Shubert of the Portland local of the electrical workers' union insisted today that the northwest strikers desired a separate decision. He announced that union men in Portland and elsewhere in the northwest are preparing to order telephones out of their homes and to induce as many families as possible to pursue the same course.

## Hearing Argument In Hyde-Benson Case

The supreme court is hearing arguments in the Hyde-Benson suits, having set aside two days for this purpose. The case on trial today comes from Crook county, but cases from Linn, Lane, Hood River, Jackson and Clackamas counties are involved. More than 30,000 acres of school land are affected and the timber on these is estimated to be worth \$200,000. The contention of the state is that Hyde secured these lands from the state by the use of dummy entrymen and that the transactions by which the state parted with title to its lands were fraudulent. The briefs filed in the case make two big volumes of more than 300 pages each. Some of these lands have passed through many hands and to "innocent third purchaser" plea is set up as one of the main defenses.

Attorney General Brown and Assistant Attorney General Bailey appear for the state and an array of attorneys for the many defendants.

## Crowds Take Hand In Riot by Suffragettes

Washington, Nov. 13.—Crowds took a hand today when 32 suffragettes staged their third picketing campaign since Saturday at the White house. Several banners were torn down by men. One suffragette who lost her banner, swung the staff at the head of a man. All the pickets and one of their assailants were arrested. The women include most of those arrested yesterday and Saturday.

Dudley Field Malone, after threatening to sue for a writ of habeas corpus, was permitted to see Miss Paul and Miss Winslow, the hunger strikers.

## HIDDEN FOOD FOUND

New York, Nov. 13.—Continuing his hunt for hidden food in New York, Chief Flynn of the secret service today placed guards over \$1,000,000 worth of eggs, unearthing in cold storage here. This discovery brings the total value of hoarded eggs found to \$1,294,434. Flynn is awaiting advice from Washington before seizing the hoarded foodstuffs and necessities here and putting them on sale.

The high school students are no pikers when it comes to subscribing to a good cause. After the addresses were made yesterday morning at the assembly and subscriptions asked, 44 students came forward and subscribed \$10 each and 58 put their names down for \$5 each. And yet the official managers of the campaign to raise money in the high schools entirely overlooked the proposition that girls might come forward and show as much patriotism as the boys.

It is goodbye to the so-called ten pound sack that weighed out nine pounds of flour and sold for 40 cents. The food commission has decided that the ten pound sack is bad business for all concerned and after the first of December there will be no more. The smallest sack will be the so-called 25-pound sack containing 24 1-2 pounds of flour. Those who want less may buy it of their grocer at six cents a pound. In the larger cities, these small sized sacks were sold to the poor and to those who lived in big apartment houses and did but very little cooking. There was considerable business in Salem. After Dec. 1, those who want small quantities of flour will get it in a grocery sack, as there will be no small sizes put up at the mills.

An agricultural council will be held Wednesday morning at the auditorium of the Commercial club for the purpose of organizing a Marion county agricultural council. F. R. Brown, county agriculturist will preside. At this meeting it is expected that delegates will attend from all the granges in the county and from all other farmers' organizations. The movement is in keeping with the national movement to organize the agricultural interests in every county to better carry out the program of the government, all in the way of helping in the present war conditions. Where a community has no agricultural organization, prominent farmers have been asked to attend. Paul V. Maris, state leader of county agricultural agents will be present and assist in the organization.

## German Propaganda Paved Way for Drive

Rome, Nov. 13.—Germany timed a propaganda of infinite artfulness to coincide with her great drive against Italy. Pamphlets printed in Italian and bearing forged imprint of Italian printers were scattered mysteriously among Italian troops. They contained cleverly contrived lies as to Italy's internal conditions. Bogus editions of Italian newspapers were circulated everywhere on the front. Articles in these false sheets declared that Italian soldiers were "shooting down thousands of women and children in an effort to suppress a revolution which had gained headway in Liguria, Tuscany and elsewhere."

## TWO HUNDRED I. W. W. ARRESTED AT OMAHA

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 13.—Police late this afternoon swooped down on I. W. W. headquarters, where a district I. W. W. convention has been in progress for the last two days, and arrested all the delegates, about 200 in number. This action was taken on instructions from Washington. The I. W. W. are charged with seditious utterances in their circulars.

Delegates from Missouri, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska were among those arrested.

## HALF Y. M. C. A. WAR FUND SUBSCRIBED

To This Amount High School Teachers and Pupils Add \$1,000

The drive for the war fund of the Y. M. C. A. is now under full headway with all workers brimming over with enthusiasm. For they all have found the people of Salem more than willing each to do a share in raising the \$7,500 quota of Salem.

At the meeting today noon at the Y. M. C. A. favorable reports were received from each of the nine captains and their co-workers.

Plan of work has been that of dividing the city into districts and making a special call at every house in the city. This has been made possible by each captain selecting ten hustling assistants.

Just as a nucleus upon which to work, the executive committee has received donations from some of the larger concerns in the city donations for \$100, making a total of \$15,250.50. Besides these \$100 donations, several firms and professional men gave \$50 each.

## Government to Help Farmers of Northwest

Portland, Or., Nov. 13.—The United States food administration today came to the relief of the Pacific northwest farmer whose wheat yield was tied up by the administration's embargo on shipment to northwest water terminals.

The officials of the Pacific administration's office here today received a telegram from Max Houser, administrator, now in New York, that carrying arrangements have been fixed so settlement or advances can be made to farmers without interest.

The embargo practically stopped all wheat movement. Farmers could not remove from their crops and many had to borrow money to pay current expenses.

Houser's arrangements, details of which are not known here, means practically that the government will buy the wheat at the shipping point or advance money on it. It will afford the farmers, particularly the big inland Empire grain growers, immediate relief.

## COAL OPERATORS ACCUSED

Terre Haute, Ind., Nov. 13.—Four coal operators of Brazil, Ind., arrested on a charge of conspiring to set a price on coal higher than that allowed by the federal government, were released on \$2500 bond each today by Court Commissioner Hamill and their hearing was set for November 23.
