For Full Publicity Suggestion that some of the delegates to the convention were charged with being in the employ of the Burns detective agency and were at the convention as "spies" was made by President Gompers in a speech opposing a resolution that a verbatim, permanent record be made of all the proceedings of the sessions.

Leon Trotsky Reports. Petrograd, Nov. 12.—(Delayed.) "Kerensky is retiring and we are on the offensive," was the note of victory in a proclamation issued today by Leon Trotsky, Bolshevik leader.

"The bourgeoisie endeavored to separate the army from the revolution," he declared.

"Kerensky attempted to break it by violence and Cossackdom. Both efforts failed."

The country sees the Soviet's authority is not a passing phase, but a unchangeable fact," Trotsky's proclamation continued.

"Polkoff's detachments in a gallant blow affirmed the cause of the revolution of workmen and peasants."

Fighting in Petrograd. Stockholm, Nov. 13.—Premier Kerensky's troops have entered Petrograd and are "masters of a portion of the city," according to a Telegraph agency dispatch received here today.

This is the first word indicating that the fighting known to have been in progress for the past 48 hours around the capital has actually reached the city itself.

The dispatch asserted that Kerensky's forces now controlled the Nevsky Prospekt. No details of the battle were given, but from private reports it was believed that the fighting had been sanguinary.

Parole Board Will Will Give No Second Chance to Prisoners

The prison parole board has decided to be much more strict in recommending prisoners for parole.

One thing agreed on is that a prisoner who violates his parole will not be given a second trial, but will be compelled to serve his full term.

The parole board has nothing to do with the selection of men for the honor gang, that being left entirely to the warden, it announces that there will be no paroles for those who escape and are returned to the prison.

The number of prisoners has been reduced about 25 per cent in the last year through paroles and other causes and this leaves the material left to select from with a large portion of those deserving paroles, removed.

In other words the board claims it is getting down to the more hardened class of prisoners and that necessarily the number of paroles will be smaller from this on.

One member of the board expresses the idea that many of those paroled had gotten into the penitentiary through drink, and that now this cause is removed the prisoners hereafter would be of a more hardened class as a whole, and naturally there would be fewer paroles.

Undoubtedly though the main reason for the action of the board is the large number of paroled prisoners finding their way back to prison through failure to make good.

Senator McNary Will Go To Eastern Oregon Senator McNary, starting Thursday, will visit Pendleton and the grain growing sections of eastern Oregon to investigate conditions, so they can be made better when he returns to Washington.

German Socialist Working for Kaiser Horion, Wis., Nov. 13.—Emil Seidel, Milwaukee socialist alderman, was at liberty on bonds today, following an alleged seditious speech against state and national officials here last night.

Plan to Dynamite Docks Is Revealed Detroit, Mich., Nov. 13.—Plans to dynamite the docks of the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation company were revealed today during the progress of police trials before police Commissioner Conzen.

The Smolny institute was reported in previous dispatches to have been put in a state of defense preparatory to withstanding a siege if necessary.

The Bolsheviks numbered sailors from the Kronstadt garrison in their forces and were fairly well armed with both rifles and machine guns.

Apparently the fighting centered on the Nevsky Prospekt—the same street which has already been repeatedly dyed with the blood of various revolutionists.

Estimates of the Bolshevik strength received here from sources favorable to them, declared the Trotsky-Lenin combination was claiming 50,000 soldiers and sailors.

All allied ambassadors and ministers here today refused to deal with the Bolsheviks. Dispatches declare that Maxim Gorky has flatly refused to support them.

Sunday's bloodshed appears to have been due to an abortive attempt by the military cadets of the city to regain control, Bolshevik supporters overwhelmed them.

There was a fresh outbreak of anarchy last night. The railway employees were reported today to have issued a formal ultimatum to the Petrograd Soviet of workmen and soldiers and the committee on assuring safety of the revolution, refusing all support unless a compromise government was devised, with an all-democratic personnel.

he set about rustling up some gift to replace them. No Sammy will find himself forgotten when reveille calls on Christmas morning, if the officers at this Atlantic port can help it.

Knitted socks by the thousands are going to the Americans abroad in these Christmas boxes. Then there are home knitted sweaters, wristlets, mouth organs, games, trench mirrors, trench kits, snookes, periscopes, compasses, mittens, books, playing cards, khaki handkerchiefs, wrist watches, family albums with pictures of the folks at home, tiny photographs and innumerable other devices for to comfort and amusement of Pershing's lads.

Whenever it was necessary to remove an article, the censor placed a little printed slip in the box saying that something had been taken out.

To one side was a heap of already badly broken boxes. Carpenters were tinkering with them, or roping them, doing everything possible to make them hang together until they reach the trenches.

There was another heap of boxes lacking addresses. On some of them the name had been obliterated or the address was insufficient. A corps of men is at work trying to ascertain to whom these gifts are consigned.

Fifty men work twelve hours a day inspecting each box as it is received. Each is given a serial number and a record kept of the man to whom it is consigned, and the sender. The officer in charge issued an appeal today for small wooden boxes in which to pack articles that might be damaged in transit.
