HIGH SCHOOL RAISES
Y. M. C. A. WAR FUND

Girls Active In Work and Subscription Will Reach \$1000 or More

"What's the matter with letting the girls in on this?"
 Such was the inquiry made yesterday morning at the assembly in the high school when talks were being made about raising \$750 for the war work fund of the Y. M. C. A.
 It seems that the state committee in assigning the quota for the several high schools had forgotten all about the girls and had issued cards with the reading, "I am an American boy. I cannot go to the trenches but I can do my bit at home."
 This didn't suit the girls of the high school yesterday and when there was talk of raising money, they asked permission to get in with the others. Hence they were given cards, and where the word "boy" appeared, they just substituted "girl."

In raising funds for the Y. M. C. A. war work, the Salem high school made a record for the state, as with its registration at 550 within a short time yesterday the sum of \$752 was raised. When the subject of funds was first suggested to the school, the sum of \$350 was thought the limit. The boys thought a per capita of \$1 might be nearer right but later put a maximum limit at \$50.

But with the girls coming in and the general wish to help, the figures were soon raised and today the maximum was placed at \$1,000. This amount the boys think will be easily reached as already the subscriptions mount to something over \$920.

In addition to the amount subscribed by the students, the teachers of the high school have subscribed \$180. A novelty in the way of raising money at the school will be that of asking the students to give everything they have in way of old jewelry, excepting of course, heirlooms. And just to make it more interesting, one of the kettles of the Salvation army has been borrowed and placed in the general hall of the school. Tomorrow morning the kettle, that has served so faithfully for the Salvation army collections, will be receiving the surplus jewels and jewelry of the Salem high school students all for the army and navy war fund of the Y. M. C. A.

Lloyd-George Will Face Bitter Political Attack

London, Nov. 13.—Indications of an approaching bitter attack on David Lloyd-George as premier, because of what he termed his "brutally frank" speech in Paris yesterday, became evident today.

Former Premier Asquith, plainly greatly excited, demanded in commonsense this afternoon when the premier would make a statement explaining his "very grave" speech.

This is the first time Asquith has taken a position apparently hostile or critical of Lloyd George since Asquith was retired as prime minister.

Lord Northcliffe, one of Lloyd George's strongest supporters in the past, arrived back in England only yesterday.

The press today generally criticized the utterances of Lloyd George led to the Northcliffe press.

Asquith's demand was greeted with cheers in commonsense. It was apparent that Lloyd George will follow, in which Lloyd George will probably be forced to fight desperately to maintain the position he has taken as regards the joint allied council.

SCHOOL BOARD HAS
WOOD SUPPLY TROUBLE

Objection Is Made to Quality Furnished by Successful Contract Bidder

The school board last evening tackled the question as to what is first growth fir and what is second growth.

When the bids for wood were awarded, the figure last fall was for \$5.50 for first growth and \$4.50 for second growth.

At the wood pile grew and grew, there was a suspicion that the old fir contracted for at \$5.50 was fairly well mixed with second growth that is worth only \$4.50 a cord. As the contract read first growth fir, the board didn't feel called on to pay the \$5.50 for a mixture. Hence, it was decided to tender \$5.00 a cord and if the man who secured the contract didn't like it, the whole thing would be passed up to the state sealer of weights and measures.

There was also a slight suspicion that the wood was being packed loose.

The people of Salem will be given an opportunity to vote on the proposed budget for 1918. According to the new law, instead of the regular public meeting to dispose of the budget, which has always been attended by hardly a baker's dozen, the budget is to be submitted at a regular election when the voter can cast a ballot either for or against the proposed budget. The voting places will be the same as at school elections and the date is Wednesday, November 28. If the budget could be turned down by the voters, the school board would be compelled to borrow enough money to carry on the schools for an entire year.

It is probable that the voters will also be called on to express their ideas as to whether to bond shall raise \$12,000 each year to retire bonds that will be due in 1920.

The boys of the high school are filled with patriotism but they would like to carry a real gun when going through the maneuvers. Director Clarke thought a broom stick might fill the bill. The boys are in earnest in their drilling as the company of 70 has purchased at its own expense regulation khaki suits and caps. Now they want real guns and have appealed to the school board to help in locating same regardless of their age or previous condition of servitude. The boys do not ask for Krag-Jorgensen. They just want guns of any ancient vintage.

With the school budget coming before the people Nov. 28 in a regular election on that date, the same as an election for school directors, and the public meeting at the city hall two days later to pass on the city's budget for 1918, the good citizen of Salem has now the chance to express an opinion as to how the money shall be spent.

TROUBLE BREWING
AT STATE PRISON
OVER FLAX PLANT

Deposed Superintendent Refused Admission to Prison Upon His Return There

Troubles at the prison have assumed various and many aspects. The latest yesterday was about 1 o'clock when Superintendent Crawford of the flax plant, who had been requested by the governor to hand in his resignation as of December first, and who supposing he was still on the job, returned to the prison and was informed by the guard at the turnkey's gate that he was "persona non grata," and that he could not enter.

It is alleged by those supposed to know, that when Warden Murphy was told by phone of the action of the governor he at once demanded the removal of Crawford without delay. To this demand the governor gave ear and Crawford was saved the trouble of writing out a resignation, as his connection with the flax industry ceased right then and there.

Mr. Crawford alleges that while he was at the state house at the request of the governor that Warden Murphy or someone under his orders entered his office which was open and removed all the letters and papers from his desk depositing them in the warden's office. Among these were letters and papers of a private character, but these were later given to him. The keys to desks and such, which were on a key ring left in the desk when he went down town were removed and his private keys handed him.

Up to the Governor
 In the meanwhile the bonus of \$150 promised by the board of control had not been allowed, the governor said he personally felt Crawford had not "made good" and was not entitled to it. This morning after a session of the board of tax commissioners the governor invited the other members of the board of control into his private office and asked their opinion as to allowing the bonus. Secretary Oleott and State Treasurer Kay took the ground that the matter was entirely in the hands of the governor, and that they had nothing to do with the prison or the flax plant, both having been turned over to the governor at his request by the legislature. The governor called Crawford into his office told him he would consult Secretary Goodin as to the bonus and let him know his decision soon.

One of the claims made by those opposed to Mr. Crawford is that he stirred up trouble and that the plant was endangered by his actions. Backing this statement they refer to a letter found on the floor of the flax plant November 8 bearing no date, and unsigned. The letter follows:

A Threatening Letter
 Crawford—There is a man in the hole back in the bull pen, Mike Anderson. He has been in there for 30 days on bread and water. This man is an old man, 55 years old. This is the first time he has ever been in any trouble. He has been here over 3 years and never been reported for breaking a rule prior to that time. There is no reason for such a hard punishment as 30 days on bread and water, that is too much for any man. Some of the men here are quite aroused over this deal. You had better do something.

"Some of the men decided that now is the proper time to let this be known and have decided that if the man is not turned out of the hole to set fire to the flax plant. These men are determined to go the limit. You can see what a fire in the flax plant would do for you. You had better take the matter up with the governor. We don't think he wants to see this place afire—too near primary. These men are going to try to do all the damage possible. If Murphy continues his favoritism by punishing one man and letting another go for the same offense. If a man is a stool pigeon he can do anything and Murphy caters to stool pigeons. Too much favoritism is Murphy's trouble. He is trying to make stool pigeons of the men. Some men he rewards for an offense and others he punishes severely. I must stop. This man must be released from the hole, if not the flax will be burned up. You know there is men here who would do anything. You take this up with the governor. No flax—no job for you. Remember to the governor that Mike Anderson must be turned out of the hole or the flax plant goes."

(Signed) Enough Said.
 Mr. Crawford turned this letter over to the warden as soon as found. It will be seen from it that Crawford had nothing to do with the matter and that the convict who wrote it simply took that means of getting the matter before the governor. If Mike Anderson was "in the hole" he was placed there by the warden's orders, not by those of Crawford.

Such is the situation, but it may change any time, but until it does Crawford seems to be at least making good as the goat. He has earned a bonus in that capacity.
