Monmouth News

(Capital Journal Special Service)
Monmouth, Or., Nov. 13.—On Satur-
day, Nov. 10, occurred the regular
monthly meeting of Monmouth grange.

There was a good attendance of the
members and during the noon hour a
number of invited guests came and part-
ook of the "scientific" dinner and re-
mained for the excellent program in
the afternoon. The breads served at din-
ner were made of the whole wheat and
of corn. Some bran, and some raisin
and nut bread—not strictly wheatless
of course, but as nearly so as may be.

Cakes and pies were conspicuously
absent though there were bran and oatmeal
cookies galore. The program began with
music by Normal Gray. Following this
President J. H. Ackerman spoke briefly
but earnestly in behalf of the army.
M. C. A. Miss Myra Butler, head of the
Domestic Science department of the nor-
mal explained how to prepare the waste
paper for shipment and asked for dona-
tions for the Red Cross. E. E. Ostrom
then gave a reading, entitled "Kissed
the Cook." Miss Gladys Phillips read-
ered a piano solo. Then came the special
feature of the day, the address by
Miss Millie of McMinnville on "Conser-
vation." As we must conserve wheat,
meats, fats and sugar for our soldiers
and the allies, the program before us is
to ascertain what other foods we can
substitute in the place of the wheat
which contain practically the same food
value. She gave a list of these and urged
that in all things we use our common
sense and that we not go to extremes. Never
over-estimate our capacity for food and
so leave a quantity to be wasted. Miss
Mills also mentioned the scarcity of
oil and cotton goods and that we should
be called on to conserve these things also. She suggested that the best way
to do this was to get out old clothes,
clean and mend them and wear them
instead of buying new ones. Miss Mills
was given a ringing vote of thanks for
her excellent and timely address. A
discussion on flour for bread, by the
Rev. Cross, followed. The speaker dis-
cussed various other timely topics were
interesting and beneficial. The next regu-
lar grange meeting will be "Brothers' Day"
when the men folks are expected to pre-
pare the dinner and wash the dishes.

About seventy-five Add Fellows and
