SAMMIES COUGHED AND BULLETS WHIZZED

Result Was That American Is Now In Hospital Nursing His Hand

With American Battalions in the Front Line Trenches, France, Nov. 22.—A slight cold sent one American Sammy to the hospital today—with a bullet through his hand.

The Sammy was a member of an American patrol lying in close proximity to German entanglements during the night. It was cold and damp and the soldier's throat tickled. He gulped a couple of times and then couldn't strangle a cough. It came out loudly in the still night.

In about a tenth of a second Boche bullets began to spray all about that section of the darkness from which the cough had been heard by the ever-vigilant German sentry. The cougher, who had betrayed the position, got his as he and his comrades of the patrol wriggled hurriedly back to the American lines, bullets showering all about them.

There is one American major today who is the most disgusted individual over here right now—unless it be the 180 of his men. The major decided he would get revenge for the German trench raid which inflicted first American casualties.

called for distribution of his men on both sides of a gap in the German wire entanglements, through which the Boches every night had slipped for little reconnoitering excursions.

The men took their pre-arranged places, lay prone on the ground, aimed their rifles at the gap—and waited. They waited and waited. Not a single German appeared. Just before dawn the major disgustedly took his boys back. It developed later that the careful Boche had decided, after having used one gap so much that it was good business to make another and not run any chances.
