Ward said he met the victim of the tragedy the day of the killing at a luncheon in New York, at which Dudley Field Malone, former collector of the port of New York, was present.

"I accompanied de Saullies and his father to the Box that evening and we had dinner there," Ward said. "Afterward we went into the living room and played the phonograph. Mrs. Degener took little Jack upstairs."

Mrs. Erasmus, mother of Mrs. de Saullies, leaned forward as Ward talked. She wore a heavy veil and peered through it with a terrified expression.

"Mrs. de Saullies stepped into the living room," Ward continued. "Jack walked toward her and held out his hand. I walked toward the mantelpiece."

"He was telling the story of his friend's death in a dull and expressionless voice," Mrs. de Saullies said she wanted to take little Jack home. This de Saullies declared impossible, as it was his day to have the boy.

"He refused to argue with her. De Saullies turned his back to his former wife and stepped away. She said: 'There's only one thing to do.'"

"I saw her bring a pistol from her sweater pocket and she fired four shots in rapid succession. I saw de Saullies stagger. Mrs. de Saullies said: 'It had to be done.'"

Attorney Uterhart's cross-examination developed that Ward was such a close friend of de Saullies that Jack, Jr. referred to him as 'Wardie man.' 'Have you ever been convicted of a crime?' Uterhart demanded.

"No," Ward answered. Uterhart produced legal papers showing Ward had been jailed for using loud, indecent language and being drunk in Rector's New York.

"I was arrested for fighting in Rector's and jailed because I couldn't pay a fine of \$10," Ward protested.

Mrs. Caroline Degener, de Saullies' sister, described the tragedy. She swept by Bianca, ignoring her as she walked to the stand and kept her eyes averted from the former wife of her brother.

GERMANS USE TEAR GAS ALONG ITALIAN FRONT

Rome, Nov. 23.—Austrian and German troops used "tear gas" in violent but unsuccessful attacks against the Italian positions on the north of the Piave line, the war office announced today. The fighting centered around the Asiago plateau, near Monte Ondere and Monte Adonecche and from there westward toward Monte Castelgomberto.

Rome Optimistic Rome, Nov. 23.—The most optimistic views of the Italian situation since General Diaz' forces took their stand along the Piave was expressed in the Rome press today. They held that the firm holding of the line during the last few days had been more than a defensive victory and had completely restored confidence.

Allied troops, it was officially announced, will be in action shortly. British artillery has been aiding for more than a week. British monitors and light naval forces effectively continued their bombardment of enemy positions along the coast line today.
