Fort Snelling, Minn.—The 36th regiment United States Infantry here today was entertained at a turkey dinner by University, town and country clubs in Minneapolis and St. Paul.

Camp Funston, Kan.—Football, Camp Funston versus University of Illinois, and other athletic events and turkey dinner in Camp Funston's celebration of "Turkey day." Four thousand soldiers were given furloughs.

Camp Bowie, Texas.—Despite a quarantine order because of eight cases of spinal meningitis, 27,000 Sammys here had the finest Thanksgiving today the nation's greatest turkey producing state could furnish.

Pittsburg, Pa.—More than a hundred western Pennsylvanians commissioned in the United States army and the United States reserve at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., this week, were spending Thanksgiving at their homes. Nearly half of this number were Pittsburgers.

Camp Zachary Taylor, Louisville, Ky.—Thanksgiving day was observed here today with roast turkey and "trimmin's." After the feed, there was a football and several basket ball games.

Hattiesburg, Miss.—The 139th field artillery at Camp Shelby here had an extra big dinner today. Moss funds were pooled and \$2500 worth of cider, cranberries, pie and all the "fixins" which go to make a regular Thanksgiving day dinner were bought.

Chicago.—Every Jacked who could obtain leave from the naval training station prepared to attend the Fort Sheridan-Great Lakes football game at Stagg Field this afternoon. Several thousand sailors ate turkey in private homes.

Camp Grant, Rockford, Ill.—Sixty one tons of turkey were to be consumed here today. Each of the 18,000 national army men was allowed 10 ounces.

Camp Dodge, Ia.—Turkey, geese, chicken and all regular Thanksgiving trimmings made up the menus around the various barracks in Camp Dodge today. There was entertainment galore for the boys, with football games, theatricals and athletic sports.

ARMY MEETS NAVY ON CHICAGO GRIDIRON

SCHOOL DIRECTORY NEW AND COMPLETE

Great Deal of Information
Contained In State Superintendent's Publication

Superintendent of Public Instruction J. A. Churchill has just published a new school directory. The pamphlet contains 150 pages and lists all of the schools in the state which employ more than one teacher. It contains the names and addresses of district clerks, superintendents and high school teachers, together with the salaries of all teachers and the special tax levies made by each district. It gives lists of apparatus and library books for high schools and the rules which these schools must meet in the high schools that have met the requirements of the state board of education and have been standardized are

Will Vote On School Budget Tomorrow

Director Harley O. White of the school board would call the attention of the voters in Salem to the fact that an election will be held in Salem Friday of this week, when every qualified voter in the city is supposed to cast a vote either for or against the proposed school budget for the coming year.

The last legislature passed a law providing for an election to act on the school budget, rather than a public meeting. At this election ballots will be provided for a yes or no vote on the budget as a whole. There will be no voting on any single item. The voter is to say whether or not he approves the proposed budget.

Another feature of the new law is that the directors do not establish the levy. They just state the amount that must be raised for maintaining the schools for the coming year and the assessor figures out the levy. This year it will figure the same as last year, 6.4 mills or possibly a fraction less.

Voting will be at the office of Wm. Brown & Co. on south Commercial street opposite the Capital Journal office. If the budget is not supported, the schools for the coming year will run on borrowed money, and the following year, the levy just double the proposed amount for this year.

Judges Won Two

Portland, Or., Nov. 29.—Virgil Hamilton, 125 pound Multnomah Athletic club wrestler, won one decision last night for the local club and the two judges won the other when they robbed Eddie Kysk, 108 pound Olympic club, San Francisco boxer of the decision which he had easily taken from Phil Neer, Multnomah boy. In the 158 pound boxing event, Emil Broeson, of Montreal, international middleweight champion, won by a knockout in the second round from J. McNerny, of the Multnomah club.

The surprise of the tournament was Hamilton's win over A. Vallancourt, the 135 Canadian wrestling champion. Hamilton took the first fall in 14 minutes and Vallancourt forfeited the second fall and match.

Sacramento May Be In. San Francisco, Nov. 29.—Sacramento will be in the Coast league next year, according to Charlie Graham of that city, and when he made the statement it was not denied by President A. T. Baum of the league, and Charles E. Virden, president of the Sacramento chamber of commerce.

Nevertheless, Ben Berry, owner of the Seals, is not so sure and he said today he still thinks Fresno would be a better league city.

Graham expressed confidence that the whole matter of transferring the Portland franchise to Sacramento would be settled by Saturday. He added, however, that Sacramento cannot be expected to "run its club on the same extravagant lines as San Francisco."

Knocked Clear Out. Cleveland, O., Nov. 29.—Police today were holding Otto Wenzel of Pittsburgh middleweight boxer, pending the outcome of the condition of Jimmy Wilson of Akron, whom Wenzel knocked unconscious in the seventh round of a scheduled 10 round bout here last night. Wilson's head struck the floor. His skull is believed to have been fractured.

Lasted But a Minute. Denver, Colo., Nov. 29.—Denver fight fans were consulting themselves with the fact that they saw the light weight champion in action, anyway.

Sailor Frankie Kirk lasted just a minute and twenty seconds, before Henry Leonard sent him to dreamland with a right to the jaw at the stockyards arena last night. Five thousand fans saw the bout.

A new feature of the directory is the section relating to rural schools. This contains an article entitled, "Health Rules of School Construction," by D. W. DeBusk of the department of education of the University of Oregon, and a chapter on "Standard Rural and Village Schools." In the letter, Mr. Churchill says:

"For a good many years the average country school in America has been attempting to teach children the rules of hygiene and sanitation through lessons from textbooks, and too frequently it has, at the same time, been setting a very bad example through violating these rules itself. It has taught the value of cleanliness and has required the children to work in an unclean schoolhouse, whose floor, walls and furniture were covered with dirt and dust. It has taught the value of fresh air and has kept the children confined in foul air that has been breathed over and over again until it reeked with poisonous gases. It has emphasized the care of the eyes and has compelled the children to work in cross lights and sometimes to sit facing the windows. It has taught the duty of personal cleanliness and righteousness and has allowed innocent children to visit filthy toilets, whose walls were covered with obscenity. It has taught these valuable lessons from textbooks, but much of the good has been discounted, if not wholly destroyed, through the more impressive lessons of bad example."

In summing up the benefits of standardizing the rural schools, Mr. Churchill says: "In reporting the results of standardizing country schools, the county superintendent of Clackamas county states that they have induced 'forty-nine districts to meet the thirteen requirements for standard schools, and many more have met nearly all the requirements, while all the rest have met some of them.' The superintendent of Clatsop county reports that 'school officers, teachers, parents and pupils are working together with a will to bring their schools up to the requirements in the way of sanitation, neatness, beautiful grounds, pleasant schoolroom conditions, attendance, etc.' Many other reports are equally as encouraging."
